Prohibition and the People.
The Springfield Republican, which "sincerely desires" the ratification of the Federal prohibition amendment, speaks words of truth and soberness. Why do the friends of that amendment, or too many of them, shrink from consulting the will of the people? They have seven years to succeed or fail in. And here is a weighty consideration which they should ponder:

It would be incomparably strengthening to the prohibition cause and particularly to the governmental agencies required later on to enforce the law, in case federal prohibition should be enacted, if it were demonstrated in an important eastern state like Massachusetts that the amendment really had a tangible popular majority in support of it. There is now danger that the amendment may be placed in the constitution by states whose population is less than the population of the states in opposition—a result not to be desired in the case of a summary law of such rigid and sweeping character.

To win one of the great states by a vote of the people would be a notable triumph. It would be a demonstration. Why don't the dries make the trial? Are they afraid of the result of a referendum?—New York Times.
