ORDINANCE NO. 110. An Ordinance to License, Regulate and Restrict the Keeping, Operating and Maintaining of Pool, Billiard and Pigeon-hole Tables, and Bowling Alleys, Within the Corporate Limits of the Village of Princeton, Minnesota.

The village council of Princeton, Minnesota, do ordain as follows: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, partnership or corporation to keep, operate or maintain any pool, billiard, pigeonhole table or tables or bowling alley, within the corporate limits of the village of Princeton, Minnesota, without first having obtained a license therefor under the authority of the common council of said village; provided however that the terms of this ordinance shall not apply to any such table, tables or bowling alley in any private home within said village.

Section 2. Any person, persons, co-partnership or corporation wishing to keep, operate or maintain any pool, billiard, pigeonhole table or tables or bowling alley, within the village of Princeton, shall first obtain license therefor by making application therefor, in writing, therein setting forth the time and place when and where such table, tables or bowling alley is to be kept and maintained, and filing said application with the village recorder of said village, which application shall be by him presented to the village council; if upon consideration thereof the same is approved by the council such approval shall be indorsed thereon and signed by the mayor, and if refused such fact shall be indorsed thereon, upon presenting such application with the approval thereof indorsed thereon to the treasurer of said village and paying to him the fee or fees as provided in section "3" hereof, the treasurer shall issue his receipt therefor, stating therein the amount of payment made and the purpose of payment; upon production of such receipt the recorder of said village shall issue to the applicant, entitled thereto, a license in accordance with said application and treasurer's receipt, which license shall be sufficient authority for the keeping, operating and maintaining of such table, tables or bowling alley or alleys as therein specified.

Provided, however, that the common council may in any case where in their opinion, the public interests of the citizens of the village require it, refuse to approve any application or grant any license for any of the above purposes, and may at any time, for the same reason revoke any license by it granted under this ordinance.

Section 3. The fee for such license shall be as follows, to-wit: One dollar (\$1) per year, or any fraction of a year, for each pool, billiard or pigeon-hole table, or bowling alley.

Section 4. Any person, persons, co-partnership or corporation offending against the provisions of this ordinance shall be, upon conviction thereof, punished by a fine of not
