Fay Craven's Pledge.
"I, the undersigned, accept the endorsement as the league candidate for the office of state senator from the 55th legislative district and I agree that if elected I will at all times vote and work for those measures and legislative acts that are approved by a majority of the members of the legislature elected by the league and organized labor."

The foregoing is the pledge given to the Nonpartisan league by Fay Craven, candidate for state senator. It is the pledge required of all league candidates. It means that the members elected by the league and by organized labor will meet behind closed doors in secret caucus and decide how the votes of these members shall be cast. Suppose, for instance, a bill is introduced to repeal the county option law, the league members and the members elected by organized labor will meet in secret and decide how Mr. Craven shall vote, provided he is elected. He would no longer be the senator to carry out the will and wishes and sentiment of the people of his district, but the city members, elected by organized labor, will be directing him how to vote. You will not even know how he will vote in the secret caucus. Should he by any chance be elected he will go to the legislature bound hand and foot, a mere chattel, a mere tool, a mere puppet, to carry out the orders, not of the farmers of Mille Lacs, Kanabec and Sherburne counties, but of the leaders of organized labor.

The secret caucus has been repudiated time and time again. It is repugnant to our American system and to every other form of substantial government from the very fact of its being conducted in secret and the well-founded suspicion which therefore attaches.

Potato Meetings for Princeton.
Plans have been formulated for some time for a three-day meeting for the potato growers of Princeton and vicinity whether from Isanti, Sherburne or Mille Lacs counties, the series of meetings to be held in the form of an institute or agricultural short course and to cover the many important phases of the potato industry. Specialists have been secured for the work. Potato variety specialists will discuss the merits and demerits of the different varieties and the need for a standardizing of varieties. A potato disease expert will discuss in full local potato diseases and suggest the most practical means of combatting these diseases. Expert potato growers will give their experiences in the production of the crop from the standpoint of methods of cultivation, varieties, yields, profits to be expected, etc. A specialist will also be on hand to go over the marketing of potatoes from every phase and standpoint. The program cannot be definitely given as yet. The meetings will be held during the latter part of November providing the danger from the influenza epidemic has cleared away by that time. It is requested that the farmers of the region be ready at short notice to avail themselves to the fullest of the advantages of these meetings. Suggestions from farmers, buyers or others will be welcomed. The object is not to give a series of talks on the raising of potatoes only, but to go to the very heart of the potato business.

Gentlemen: In announcing my candidacy for State Representative I desire to call your attention to the following:

In the first place I realize that agriculture is the leading industry in this district and that the success and prosperity of our citizens depend almost wholly upon the success which comes from the production and economical distribution of farm products.

I am now, and for six years have been, the secretary of the Kanabec County Agricultural society and, after serving as treasurer of the Minnesota Federation of County fairs, was re-elected to that position.

I grew up on a farm in Grass Lake township, this county, and during an active life have been closely and intimately identified and associated with the farmers and farming conditions, not only in my own section of the state but throughout the northwest, and because of this fact I feel that I am competent to act and speak for the best interests of all farmers in this district.

For fifteen years I have used my energies and abilities to assist in selling and developing that section of Minnesota in which I live. I have been actively engaged in selling lands to actual farmers and settlers who have turned the cutover lands into productive farms. In addition to the selling of farm lands I have also been engaged in developing wild lands, part of which I am now farming.

I have been a resident of Mora for twenty-five years, and during that time have been honored by its citizens with being elected a member of the village council for six years; four years as president, which position I now hold.

In 1906 I was nominated and elected county treasurer of Kanabec county, having the distinction of being, at that time, the youngest county treasurer of any county in the state. I was re-elected at each succeeding election and held the office continuously for eight years.

I have been a constant advocate of temperance legislation and was one of the first to advocate, work and vote to abolish the saloons, which was made possible under our local option and county option statutes, and of course would use my every effort to further the interest of the dry cause.

I believe my knowledge of agricultural conditions, coupled with the training I have had as a public official and the knowledge I have acquired with regard to public affairs, qualifies me to act as your representative in the state legislature, and I

At the present time I am County Food administrator and chairman of several committees and other war activities, which work I feel should receive first consideration.
