Wasting the People's Money.
The amazing fact that the war department has sent 35,993 surplus motor vehicles to France since the signing of the armistice, although there was already a surplus over there, was revealed by Representative Reavis of Nebraska in his speech urging the adoption of his resolution directing the immediate sale of all surplus army motor vehicles.

"Since the signing of the armistice," said Mr. Reavis, "more than 70,000 vehicles have been delivered to the war department. Of this number 35,993 were sent to France. Why this was done no one seems to know, as it was evident there would be a surplus over there. This surplus later developed to be \$310,000,000 worth of motor transport equipment which was sold to France at about 20 cents on the dollar.
"The war department wants to keep 53,000 vehicles, but if the size of the army is fixed at 500,000 this would be one vehicle for every ten men."
This is but one small instance of the manner in which the Wilson administration has, figuratively speaking, dumped the people's money into the sewer.
