Proceedings of Board of County Commissioners, Mille Lacs County.

Auditor's Office, Mille Lacs County, Minn., Princeton, Minn., January 6th, 1920.

The board of county commissioners of Mille Lacs county met pursuant to law in annual session at the office of the county auditor of said county.

The following members of the board were present: F. C. Cater, John Levanu, Carl Eckdall, John G. Axell and Peter Schlin.

Meeting called to order at 11 o'clock a. m., by the chairman, Peter Schlin.

On motion made and carried F. C. Cater was declared secretary, chairman of the board for the ensuing year.

On motion made and carried John G. Axell was declared duly elected as vice chairman of the board for the ensuing year.

The following standing committees were duly elected for the ensuing year: County home committee, Cater, Levanu and Axell.

Court house committee, Cater.

Board and bridge committee, all members of the board, Chairman Cater to act as chairman of the committee.

On motion the following were duly appointed by the county board as members of the county board of health for the ensuing year, to-wit: Dr. L. E. Odell, Peter Schlin and F. C. Cater.

Moved and unanimously carried that an appropriation of \$300.00 be made out of the county revenue fund to pay the incidental expenses of the county, incurred for postage of the county officers entitled thereto, and express, freight and drayage charges on the county and for all other necessary incidental expenses.

Moved and unanimously carried that an appropriation of \$500.00 be made out of the county revenue fund and set aside for a county attorney's contingent fund for the ensuing year as provided by law.

On motion Commissioner F. C. Cater was appointed as purchasing agent for the county home for the ensuing year.

On motion board adjourned until 1:30 o'clock p. m.

At 1:30 p. m. board reconvened as per adjournment with all members present.

At 2 o'clock p. m. the matter of the official printing of the county for the year 1920 was taken under consideration by the board.

January 8th, 1920, board reconvened as per adjournment at 11 o'clock a. m. with all members present except Peter Schlin, commissioner of the 5th district.

A petition was presented to the board signed by members of school district No. 5, town of Greenbush, asking that certain lands be set off from school district No. 10 to and adjoining school district No. 5, and the same was on motion made and carried as follows:

Resolved, that the lands described in said petition be set off from common school district No. 5 to school district No. 10, on the following reasons: That the lands are not attached to con. school district No. 5; that the lands are attached to con. school district No. 10; that the petition appearing regular on the 2nd day of December, A. D. 1919, for the action of said board thereon; and whereas, it was thereupon ordered by said board that a hearing should be had on said petition at a session of said board commencing on the 6th day of January, 1920, at the county auditor's office in the village of Princeton in said county; and whereas, it was further ordered in and by said order that notice of the time and place of such hearing be given by posting a notice of said hearing in three public places in each of the school districts to be affected by said petition, and by serving upon the clerk of each of said school districts, personally, a copy of said notice, at least ten days before the time appointed for such hearing, and by giving two weeks published notice thereof in the Princeton Union, a duly qualified newspaper printed and published at Princeton, Minn., in said county; and whereas, at the session of said board commencing on the 6th day of January, 1920, proof of the publication, posting and service of said notice of hearing as therein directed and required, more than ten days prior to said last named date, having been made and filed, said petition was publicly read and considered by the board, with everything which was said by said interested parties for or against granting the prayer of the petitioner and being satisfied from all the evidence produced at such hearing that the allegations of said petition are true, and said board being of the opinion that the prayer of said petitioner should be granted, it is hereby ordered and determined, that the following described land, to-wit: Lot 1 of section 5, township 42 of range 25, be and the same is hereby set off from consolidated school district No. 10 to school district No. 5, and said land is hereby named school district for all purposes whatever.
