MINNESOTA IS MOVING RIGHT UP AMONG NATION'S BIG CORN STATES



SEED CORN TIME SEPT. 10-20

High Rank Is Gained In Spite of the Short Season.

Minnesota is climbing as a corn state. Ten years ago its corn acreage was 1,690,000 and its yield not quite 59,000,000 bushels. Last year its corn acreage was 2,970,000 and its yield 118,000,000 bushels. Its acreage has grown about 75 per cent in ten years and its yield a little more than 100 per cent. In point of total yield Minnesota ranks seventh among the corn states of the country. In point of yield per acre it ranks fifth.

Corn-Growers Handicapped. Minnesota has climbed to this position as a corn state in spite of a serious handicap—the shortness of the season.

This handicap imposes the need of special care on the Minnesota corn-grower. For seed he must get corn that has matured before Sept. 20, because the Minnesota corn area has a killing frost not later than that date and seed corn which has matured before that time of year will usually produce corn which will mature before that

time the next year. He must select seed corn early, also, so that he may have time to dry it thoroughly before freezing weather comes. If it is not dry before frozen it is sure to be injured.

Four Things To Do. The Agricultural Extension Division of the University, therefore, is urging on the farmers of Minnesota four things:

The selection of seed corn during Seed Corn Time, September 10-20.

The selection of seed corn from a field of corn adapted to the locality.

The storing of this seed corn in a dry well ventilated place where it will dry quickly and stay dry.

The selection of 50 ears of corn for each acre to be planted the following year, in order to provide for reselection in the spring.

A. D. Wilson, extension director of the University Department of Agriculture, is urging these points on all the farmers in Minnesota in a letter being sent directly from University Farm.



"I wasn't yawning, my dear," replied her husband meekly. "I was just trying to say something."




