OFFICIAL PUBLICATION. Notice of a Proposed Resolution for the Construction of Sewers and Water Mains for the Village of Princeton, Minnesota.

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the Village Council of the Village of Princeton, Minnesota, held on the 2nd day of May, 1922, there was presented and read a resolution, the resolutions hereinafter set forth, which resolutions will be considered for passage by the Village Council at a meeting to be held in the Armory building in said Village of Princeton, Minnesota, on the 14th day of May, 1922, at 8 o'clock in the evening, and place the owners of property subject to assessment for the cost of said improvements appear and make objections, if any they have, to the contemplated improvement, and the payment of said assessments, at which time said resolutions may be amended and passed, or passed as proposed, subject to the following:

Whereas the Village Council of the Village of Princeton, Minnesota, has adopted an ordinance establishing and creating sewer districts for the Village of Princeton, Minnesota, and that the boundaries of said districts, and

Whereas it is necessary and proper for the preservation of the public health and conveniences, and in anticipation of further improvement, that a part of said sewer district be now constructed, and the various sewers to be constructed and the same are hereby designated as follows:

That part of Sewer District No. 1 commencing at the Man Hole near the intersection of Eastern Ave. and Third Street, thence running north on said Eastern Street to First Street, thence east on First Street to the outlet in Run River.

That part of Sewer District No. 2 commencing at the Man Hole at the intersection of Fifth and E Streets, thence south on said E Street to Fourth Street, thence east on Fourth Street to its outlet in the Run River. Also commencing at the manhole in the intersection of E and F Streets, thence east on said F Street to Fifth Street, thence east on said Fifth Street to E Street, and there connecting with the sewer in Sewer District No. 2.

And be it further resolved, that the above system of sewers be established by the Village Council of the Village of Princeton, Minnesota, and that the various sewers and supplementary thereto, and that the various sewers and supplementary thereto contained, shall be applicable to and govern all existing and proposed construction of said system of sewers, the assessment of the cost of construction and the payment of the same in all things connected therewith, whatsoever.

And be it further resolved, that the plans and specifications for all sewer districts, hereinafter referred to, be approved by the Minnesota State Board of Health, and that the same be approved this 9th day of May, 1922. Approved this 9th day of May, 1922. S. R. JONES, Clerk.

Water Resolution. Whereas, the Village Council of the Village of Princeton, Minnesota, has adopted and approved a general water works system for the Village of Princeton, Minnesota, and that the various sewers and supplementary thereto, and that the various sewers and supplementary thereto contained, shall be applicable to and govern all existing and proposed construction of said system of sewers, the assessment of the cost of construction and the payment of the same in all things connected therewith, whatsoever.

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that such part of the water works system for the Village of Princeton, Minnesota, as are hereinafter designated be constructed, and that the various lines to be so constructed be and the same are hereby described as follows:

Commencing at the present hydrant in front of the City Hall, thence running south on Eastern Avenue to Vine Street, and west on Vine Street to Plymouth Street, thence south on Plymouth Street to Union Street, thence north on Union Street using a 4-in. main, and there connecting with the present mains and completing the circuit.

Relaying the present 4-in. main on E Street between Second and Third Streets with an 8-in. main and there running north on E Street to Sixth Street; also on Sixth Street from E to F Street, using a 6-in. main; and there running north on F Street from Fifth to Ninth Street, using a 4-in. main.
