Mrs. A. W. Meyers Passes Away.

Last week the Union printed a short notice of the death of Mrs. A. W. Meyers, Deceased, whose maiden name was Anna Byl, was born at Vriesland, Ottawa Co., Mich., December 12, 1856. On April 17, 1890, at New Holland, S. D., Rev. C. Bode united her in marriage to Rev. A. W. Meyers, who formerly served as pastor of the local Dutch Christian Reformed church for eleven years. Rev. and Mrs. Meyers started their wedded life at New Holland, S. D., where they were engaged in Christian work for five years, and then they moved to Baldwin, Wis., where their faithful services never ceased for the Master until in 1905 they moved to Cincinnati, where they continued in their labors until 1907, at which time they located in our village and have since resided until Mrs. Meyers peacefully passed away Saturday, May 20, at 8 p. m., after having been a great sufferer and invalid for 10 years. She had known for some time that the end was near, and although her body suffered much, she bore her cross with great fortitude, but was willing and waiting to answer the summons of her God. "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord."

Mrs. Meyers had been a faithful member of the Dutch Christian Reformed church for years, and by divine help endeavored to manifest a true Christian spirit to those who had

the pleasure of her acquaintance, and her influence for good will long be remembered by her many friends.

During her maidenhood years she taught school for 10 years and was especially fond of children and took a great interest in them, and throughout her life this interest never ceased, and truly the children will miss her as their personal friend. In appreciation of this friendship the school children gathered at the home of Rev. Meyers Tuesday afternoon and sang "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" and "Blessed Assurance," two of her favorite songs which she had requested be sung after her departure. The funeral, which was the largest ever held in Pease, was conducted Wednesday afternoon and the beautiful flowers placed upon her casket showed in what respect our friend was held. Just before the body was laid to rest several young ladies sang "In My Home Over There" and "Shall We Meet Beyond the River." Rev. De Bruin of Ogilvie gave a short discourse in the Dutch language, but the sermon, which was delivered by Rev. J. G. Van De Lunne, was spoken in the English language in compliance with our wishes.

Deceased leaves to mourn her passing on a loving husband, Rev. A. W. Meyers; sister, Mrs. Sarah Ernisse, Vashon, Wash.; two brothers, Dr. J. J. Byl, San Jos, Cal., and F. Byl of St. Johnsbury, Vermont; two nieces, Misses Agnes and Esther De Vries of Rochester, who were present at the funeral, and one nephew, Fred De Vries of Mayville, Wis. The De Vries children will greatly miss their aunt for she has been to them a mother since they were left motherless many years ago. She also leaves many friends here and elsewhere. We join with friends in extending our sympathy to the bereaved ones in their hour of sorrow.


