RED CROSS HEALS WOUNDS OF WAR

25,000 Disabled Ex-Service Men in Hospitals After Four Years of Peace.

CHAPTERS' FIELD OF SERVICE

Every Veteran Needing Help Gets Individual Attention of Sympathetic Workers.

When on November 11 the world halts to observe the fourth anniversary of Armistice Day, and the American Red Cross inaugurates its Annual Roll Call for the enrollment of the 1923 membership, the people of the United States may well pause to think of the unparalleled contribution to the cause of peace made by our Army and Navy in the World War.

The Government without stint is undertaking to furnish these disabled men with the compensation and medical care to which they are entitled, yet their especial care is a duty of the Red Cross. Why? Because the Government cannot handle the cases of ex-service men individually; it must handle these men in bulk under a standardized policy.

2,679 Chapters Aiding Veterans. In this work, upon whose accomplishment the American Red Cross is urging a record-breaking enrollment in the Roll Call which opens on Armistice Day, 2,679 Chapters in all parts of the country are engaged. This is 350 more than were working for ex-service men last year when approximately \$10,000,000 was expended by the National Organization and the Chapters working together in harmonious unity.

Hospital and District Office Work. During the fiscal year a total of over 1,000 persons, paid and volunteer, has been engaged in Red Cross duty in hospitals or district offices of the U. S. Veterans' Bureau.

FROM ANCIENT GREEK COINS. Curator of Boston Museum Believes He Has Found Origin of Old Golden Receptacle.

"Another very interesting feature of the 'bowl,'" said Mr. Caskey, "is its inscription. 'The sons of Cypselus dedicated this from Heraclia.' The bowl was found at Olympia and it is thought that it was a part of the spoils after the conquest of Heraclia. Cypselus figures as one of the worst tyrants of Greek history, so the inscription bearing his name is considered of historical value. One son of Cypselus Pericanda was titled one of the seven wise men of Greece."

Plan Fine African Roadway. For several years work has been in progress on a roadway to encircle the entire peninsula at the southern extremity of South Africa, on which Capetown is situated. The roadway is now completed, and at the opening ceremonies, last May, it was claimed to be the finest marine drive in the world; surpassing even the famous Corniche road, at Mentone, in the south of France. The road is 125 miles long, and for most of its length is hewn in the rocky sides of the mountains that tower over the entire sea coast of the cape.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Good Indications of Oil in Bolivia. A company has been organized recently for the purpose of exploiting the petroleum deposits said to exist near Cochabamba, Bolivia. It is reported that numerous indications of petroleum have been found in the vicinity of Cercado and of Quillaquito, including readily inflammable gases emanating from two wells in the locality. Favorable reports on this section have been previously made by reputable geologists.
