Cancer and Its Symptoms.

Bloodgood of Baltimore, one of the most famous cancer specialists in the world, was in Minneapolis on Saturday and delivered several addresses. If the condition has existed for so long a time that it is impossible to remove all the tissue affected, according to the present knowledge of the physicians and surgeons, the case would seem to be hopeless.
