
We appeal the names of honorary and active patronesses, and call the attention of the public to its duty to support the enterprise with enthusiasm, and give it Godspeed.

If you have not registered do so today or you cannot vote. Today is the last registration day.


It has been figured out that the Republicans will have a majority of 27 in the next Congress.
