

WHAT IS IT?

The Treasury. Some idea may be formed of the magnitude of the National Treasury Department, and the great strain upon the physical strength of the chief of that branch of the Government service, from the statement made by the New York Star to the effect that "the head of the Treasury Department is responsible for the supervision of 18,357 officers and other persons employed by the Treasury. There are in the department 661 officers nominated by the President and confirmed by the senate, of whom 32 are in Washington."

Of the appointment of every other person the head of the department and not the President is by the primary responsibility. Of the latter there are 3,327 in Washington, and 9,279 elsewhere. During the last fiscal year the pay roll of the Treasury was the enormous sum of \$16,661,281.37.
