

Articles of Incorporation
OF THE
Northwestern Publishing Company.

KNOW all men by these presents: That, we, the undersigned do hereby associate ourselves together and adopt and sign the following Articles of Incorporation, for the purpose of becoming and constituting a body corporate as hereinafter provided.

ARTICLE I.
The name of this corporation shall be "The Northwestern Publishing Company."

ARTICLE II.
The general nature of the business of this corporation shall be the printing, conducting and publishing of a newspaper, and the conducting of a general job printing office; and the principal place for the transaction of the business of this corporation shall be the city of St. Paul, County of Ramsey and State of Minnesota.

ARTICLE III.
The time of commencement of this corporation shall be the first day of February, 1887, and the same shall continue for the period of Thirty-years thereafter.

ARTICLE IV.
The number of the shares of the Capital Stock of the corporation shall be five thousand (5,000) and the amount of each share shall be ten (\$10) dollars. And said capital stock, shall be paid in such manner and at such times as the board of directors of said corporation shall direct.

ARTICLE V.
The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall be at any time subject shall be two thousand (\$2,000) dollars.

ARTICLE VI.
The government of said corporation shall be vested in a board of seven directors, from whom shall be chosen a president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer for the corporation.

The said board of directors shall be elected annually by the stockholders of the corporation at an regular annual meeting of the said stockholders to be held on the first Monday in February in each year, at the office of the said Northwestern Publishing Company.

Each successive board of directors shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and qualify.

The Board of Directors shall have power to fill all vacancies occurring in its members by death, removal or resignation, and the persons chosen to fill such vacancies shall hold their offices until the next annual meeting and until their successors are elected and qualified.

ARTICLE VII.

Adams, St. Paul, Minn.; Will Turner, Minneapolis, Minn.; L. H. Reynolds, Minneapolis, Minn.; Thos. H. Lyles, St. Paul, Minn.; J. K. Hilyard, St. Paul, Minn.

ARTICLE VIII.


