### LOCAL NEWS.

#### Indians on Maine Prairie.

As we go to press this note is handed us. It is from a well-known citizen of Maine Prairie to his wife, in St. Cloud.

#### THURSDAY MORN.

DEAR AUGUSTA.—We were cutting my wheat yesterday, when a man came running saying that he had started back to Cold Springs with three men, women and children in an ox team. They had got a mile beyond John White's when 2 Indians arose, one fired at one man, not more than 20 feet off, but missed him. Both men fired, and one Indian dropped as though killed; they then turned the team around and ran the oxen back to the cutter house, the Indians trying to head them but did not succeed. Two men stayed and one came through and told me.—We took a wagon and went over and got the family out to a safe place and then we went up to find the dead Indian, we found two blankets, a shawl, bed cord and gun cover, and some blood but no Indian. We had an alarm this morning about 4 o'clock I have not time to give particulars. E. H. ATWOOD.

#### Frontier Protection.

Prompt and vigorous measures have been taken for the protection of our extensive frontier and the punishment of the savages.

Two regiments of infantry, the Minnesota Sixth and Seventh are now actually in the field.

Nine companies of the Sixth and seven of the Seventh are in the expedition under Col. Sibley.

One company of the Sixth and two of the Seventh have gone up the Mississippi in the direction of Crow Wing, and the remaining company of the Seventh (Capt. Strout) has gone westerly, to the scene of the recent disturbances in Meeker County.

Alex. Moore, Esq., from Sauk Center, Stearns county, was in town yesterday to have troops sent up the Sauk Valley. The Governor promptly ordered Captain Barrett and his company, from St. Cloud, to march there as soon as possible. The news was received by the boys at the Fort with great satisfaction, as many of them are from the Sauk country.

Capt. N. P. Colburn, Fillmore county, and Capt. C. F. Beck, of Winona, have been authorized to raise two companies of Frontier Rangers, to proceed forthwith to the southwestern counties of the State.

Capt. Davis, of Goodhue county, horse company, already raised, is ordered to cross the Minnesota at Caryer, and proceed to Fort Abercrombie, via St. Cloud, scouring the country as he goes along.

Capt. Nelson, of Monticello, who has about thirty mounted men, will accompany Capt. Strout's company, of the Seventh Regiment, through the country, to Forest City and beyond.

Capt. A. J. Edgerton, of Dodge county, has gone through to the seat of war on the Upper Minnesota, by way of the Winnebago Agency.

Capt. James Starkey is authorized to raise a force of mounted men for the protection of the settlements on the Upper St. Croix, and its tributaries.

George W. Few, of Little Canada, is authorized to form a company of mounted men, and will recruit for the same in the same in the region of country lying between Little Canada and Sunrise City. The company to organize as soon as possible, and be held in readiness against hostile Indians attacking our settlers.

Joseph B. Jones, of Benton county, is authorized to recruit a company of cavalry or mounted infantry, and clothed with power to impress horses and forage for the service. O. B. Day, John Sherwood and Jonathan Ferrin, are appointed appraisers.—St. Paul Press, Sat. Aug. 30.

The news received up to the latest hour, last evening, from Fort Ridgely was to the effect that the garrison was awaiting the arrival of reinforcements and the relief of the siege.

Col. Sibley did not move his command to St. Peter on Monday, as we stated, but he did so on Tuesday, and arrived at Fort Ridgely, last evening.

The missionaries, Revs. Messrs. Riggs and Williamson, and their families, neighbors, and others, to the number of forty-five, hitherto reported massacred, have reached the settlements on the Minnesota

Their has been no additional news received from Fort Ripley or the Chippewa Agency.

A Marylander says that in the middle of that State, there lives a preacher that has two sons. Some way observes that the Southern Confederacy is now bounded of the north by McClellan, Burnside, and Pope; on the east by Hunter, Wilkes, and Dupont; on the south by Fort Pickens and Ben. Butler; and on the west by Farragut, Davis, and Halleck.

The Knights of the Golden Circle—a secret treasonable society—are "coming to grief" in a sue portion of Illinois. The U. S. Marshal has taken into custody a considerable number of persons charged with being members of the order, and with attempts at resisting the laws and discouraging enlistments. Congressman Allen, Judge, Duff, and the states attorney, of the Cairo district, have been held there to answer charges of treason. The proofs against them are said to be overwhelming. The Ploomington Times was destroyed by the people of that place, on Wednesday, for secession sentiments. It is said the editor took the oath and afterwards, having declared he intended to disard it, the mob would have hung him had he not fled.

Gov. Joseph Wright of Indiana was recently speaking at Rockville, upon the propriety of employing negroes in this war, when a Democratic "butternut" called out from the audience, "We have enough white men to finish the war." "Yes, I know it," replied the Governor, "but they are not all of the right sort."

ADVICES FROM ABROAD.—Foreign correspondents say the destiny of the American Union is talked with less confidence by the liberal party than at any former period. In England our most ardent friends despair of our success. We are on the edge of a volcano, and nothing but an overwhelming victory, or a proclamation of universal emancipation, will continue to hold the public opinion of Europe.—Wash. Cor. Tribune.

NEGROES AHEAD AND TRIUMPHANT.—At last the colored population are ahead of the white, and are triumphant. They have rights, of which they may enjoy full possession, which white men have not. They can go to Canada whenever and as often as they please. White men must stay at home. They can accompany colored folks on a little pleasure journey over the line. [GENERAL ORDERS NO. TWENTY-TWO.]  
Pursuant to instructions from the War Department, the township assessors of the several wards of the several cities, in preparing a list of persons between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, liable to militia duty, not only take the names of such persons, but also state their ages and occupation, whether native or foreign born citizens, and if the latter, whether naturalized or whether they have simply declared their intention to become citizens. They will also state, under the head of general remarks, any physical defect of the person enrolled, such as deafness, blindness, loss of speech, etc.

Such assessors as may have already, either partly or entirely completed their lists, will correct the same according to these instructions, and will receive a reasonable compensation from the U. S. for extra duties imposed upon them under this order.

County Auditors will see that the assessors prepare their militia lists without delay, and will, if any assessor or assessors in their respective counties fail to prepare said lists, immediately inform this office of the name of such assessor or assessors.

The County Auditors are also requested to forward with all convenient speed a copy of such militia lists to this office, at the militia of each township respectively.
