

## LOCAL NEWS.

**INVALID SOLDIERS.**—On Saturday evening last a number of teams came from Fort Abercrombie with sick and disabled soldiers from Gen. Sibley's expedition, taking them to Ft. Snelling.

**ANOTHER TRAIN.**—Burbank & Co. are engaged in loading another train of one hundred wagons with Government stores for Fort Abercrombie. The escort is to be at Sauk Centre, prepared to start, on the 1st of August. Teams are daily arriving in this city from St. Paul with supplies to be taken through.

**RAIN.**—On Saturday evening we were favored with a fine shower that was quite beneficial. On Tuesday night there was a little more rain with a great deal of wind. Up Sauk River there was a much greater proportion of rain and less wind.

**HORSES AND STORES.**—On Sabbath thirty horses for Col. Thomas came from Fort Snelling and were sent to Paynesville to be used in mounting infantry for the scout. On the following day came a number of wagons loaded with ordnance stores.

**PERSONAL.**—On Friday evening last Lieut. Col. Rogers, of the 8th regiment, commandant at Fort Ripley, arrived in town to take charge of affairs in the First Sub-District during Col. Thomas' absence. We had the pleasure this week of meeting Mr. E. W. Sims, lately of Anoka, who has removed to this place and associated himself with his brother, L. G. Sims, in the drug business.

**CROPS.**—Farmers from Maine Prairie assure us that the yield of grain this season will be much better than was anticipated. Barley and rye have been but little injured, corn does not seem to feel the effects of the drouth, while the yield of wheat and oats will be quite fair and the quality excellent. The rains of the past week will tend still more to improve this, and the ill effects of the long dry season will not be nearly so serious as was imagined. We hear almost similar reports from other localities in this section of the State.

**TRANSFERRED.**—On Friday last Lieut. J. R. Pufman, late aid to Gen. Sibley's staff, passed through town, having been transferred to the signal corps and ordered to report to Gen. Rosecrans.

**A FAITHFUL OFFICER.**—We presume there is no officer occupying the same position in Minnesota who has performed a greater amount of service during the past year than Capt. T. D. Smith, A. Q. M. The entire route from St. Cloud to Fort Abercrombie has been under his charge and an amount of labor sufficient for a half dozen Quartermasters laid on his shoulders, yet the duties have been performed surprisingly well. A change is being made which will relieve him to some extent, and his headquarters will hereafter be at Ft. Abercrombie. Capt. S. is the same officer who so effectively defended the Fort last summer from the Indians, and but for whom, the testimony is, it could not have held out.

**IMMIGRANTS.**—A steady stream of immigration continues to flow into this County, finding good homes in different localities. On Monday a string of wagons passed through town destined for St. Joe. The party was well supplied with stock, &c.

**Ob Tuesday** some families named Coaspart, consisting of seventeen persons, from Illinois, stopped a short time while en route to Maine Prairie. Their wagons and abundance of really excellent stock formed quite a cavalcade.

Many others find their way into the County through different channels, and the Indian troubles seem to have but little effect upon the minds of those who want good homes in a fertile and growing State. Northern Minnesota, and especially Stearns County, is pushing forward vigorously.
