TOWN MATTERS.—Some matters of interest were transacted at the Town Meeting on Tuesday of last week which we were unable to give in our last issue.

District No. 1, Oscar Taylor; No. 2, John H. Owen; No. 3, Philip Beaupre; No. 4, William Pattison; No. 5, G. W. Harvey; No. 6, F. Hartmann; No. 7, John Gross.

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors be directed to take up and cancel the Two Years Military Orders on the application of the holders thereof, and issue in their stead, orders receivable for taxes for the current year, in an amount equal to the town military tax of such applicant, the gross amount thereof in connection with the one year military orders already issued not to exceed the amount of the military tax raised or assessed for the current year.

Resolved, That the Town Clerk and Supervisors be authorized to credit the bills of the Supervisors for procuring recruits during the past year, but not to allow an amount exceeding \$3 per day for the time actually employed by the Supervisors in procuring recruits.

The Board of Supervisors, as ex officio Auditors of the Town, reported the following amounts allowed during the year ending March 31st, 1865:

Town bounty allowed to 78 recruits enlisted during the past year to the credit of the town; necessary expenses allowed for obtaining the same and their transportation to St. Paul, \$21,513.97

(Making the average cost of each recruit \$275.82)

Amount allowed Committee for conducting recruiting, and amount paid for transportation of enrolled men to St. Paul to procure exemption, as per vote at a Special Town Meeting, held July 31st, 1864, \$557.13

Total military claims, \$22,071.12

Of the above amount there was levied and assessed the past year \$7,220.67

Leaving a balance to be provided for, \$14,850.45

With the interest accruing thereon at the rate of ten per cent. per annum. Half of this amount will be assessed for next year's taxes, and the balance the year following.

The general town expenses were, \$595.85

All you that want to keep your dogs go to Clerk Mattoon's office and register them.

Town Clerks can procure suitable blanks for licenses at this office, already printed.

DELAID.—Farmers have been delayed somewhat in their spring work by the late snow and rain storms.

Many of them had their plowing done, and were ready to commence sowing, when the snow and blustering weather prevented.
