SUCCESSOR OPERATION.—On Sabbath last, Dr. Tolman and Wheelock amputated the left leg of a young man named Christian Lenger, living near Cold Spring, taking off the limb at the thigh. The bone had become diseased from some scrofulous complaint. Yesterday the young man was doing well.

MILITARY.—On Friday a company of cavalry, under command of Capt. James Payne, arrived in town and camped near the ravine bridge until Tuesday morning. They were destined, a part for Fort Washburn, and a part for Abercrombie.

DIED.—William Miner, a member of Company B, 2d Minnesota Cavalry, died at this place, on Sabbath, of lung fever. He was from Lynden, Mower County, in this State. His remains were sent to Fort Snelling.
