But four States have given birth to Presidents, viz: Virginia 6—Washington, Madison, Jefferson, Monroe, Harrison and Tyler. Massachusetts 2—John and John Quincy Adams. South Carolina 1—Jackson. New York 1—Van Buren.

New York has furnished the largest number of Vice Presidents, viz: 4; Massachusetts and Virginia, each two, &c.

Of the Secretaries of State, the highest number has been furnished by Virginia, viz: 5; Massachusetts ranks next, 3.

It is a singular fact, that 6 Secretaries of the Treasury have been Pennsylvanians, while no other State has furnished more than one each.

Almost the same unequal division obtains with regard to the War Department; 5 of the Secretaries were from Massachusetts; 3 from New York; 2 each from South Carolina and Tennessee.

Massachusetts also furnished the most Secretaries of the Navy, 3. Maryland, New York, New Jersey and North Carolina, each 2.

Five of the Postmasters General have come from the Western and 6 from the Atlantic States.

The States of Virginia, Pennsylvania and Maryland, have each given three Attorneys General and Kentucky two.

Of the six Chief Justices, two have come from New York.

New York and Massachusetts are the only States which have furnished officers for every one of the above named Departments of Government. No Secretary of the Treasury or Postmaster General has been a Virginian. And though Pennsylvania has given six Secretaries of the Treasury, and three Attorneys General, she has had but one Representative in any other branch.

Maryland has been represented in every department of the Cabinet and Judiciary except the Post Office.

Georgia has furnished a Secretary of State, of War, of the Treasury, a Postmaster General, and an Attorney General, and ranks seventh in the list of States giving officers to the Government.

Both the officers from North Carolina were Secretaries of the Navy. Both the officers from New Jersey were in the same department.

Fifty-three have been appointed from slave holding States, and sixty from free States, or those North of Maryland.

Five States, viz: Alabama, Missouri, Indiana, Michigan, and Arkansas have had no citizen in a diplomatic station.

Of the several appointments, J. Quincy Adams has had the largest number, having been sent to the Courts of England, Netherlands, Portugal, Russia, Prussia, and also one of the three Envoys Extraordinary and Ministers Plenipotentiary, for negotiating the treaty of Ghent. In addition to the 2 diplomatic missions, Mr. Adams has also been a member of Congress—once of the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, Secretary of State, President of the United States; besides being Professor of Rhetoric and Oratory in Harvard University. Two brothers, the Everetts, also from Massachusetts, have been Ministers to the Netherlands, to Spain, and to England. Of those who have been foreign Ministers, five have since been elected Presidents, viz: Monroe, Adams, Jackson, Van Buren and Harrison.

New York, " 5
Connecticut, " 5
Pennsylvania, " 4
Maryland, " 3
South Carolina, " 2
New Hampshire, " 2
North Carolina, " 2

New Jersey,
and one each from Georgia and Rhode Island.

From all these tables it will be evident that the two states which have had the most influence in our councils, civil and military, are Virginia and Massachusetts.

The great drama of the Revolution commenced at Lexington in one, and closed at Yorktown in the other. The President of the first Congress was from one; the first President of the Union, was from the other. The first signer of the Declaration of Independence was from one; the first signer of the Constitution of the United States from the other. The great leaders of the Federal and Democratic parties, Adams and Jefferson, resided in Massachusetts and Virginia; each a signer of the Declaration of Independence; each a negotiator of his country's treaties in Europe, and having both served with noblest integrity, their day and generation, they were together summoned hence, and on the fiftieth anniversary of that immortal day which saw them together, pledging their "lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honors" in the cause of Independence, they departed from earth, borne upwards by the anthems of a nation's Jubilee.—*Savannah Georgian.*
