A NEW COUNTERFEIT.

The Cincinnati Republican says—"A few days ago we took notice of a new counterfeit \$100 note, on the bank of Cleveland, without saying that it was on the Commercial Bank of Lake Erie, payable at Cleveland. The one alluded to has the denomination \$100 on the two right hand corners, on the lower left hand corner, and in the middle near the top. There are three vignettes on it; one, and the largest, on the left hand, comprising a group of three persons; one a female looking towards the centre. The one on the right of the note represents a southern port with a steamboat in the distance, some shipping at the landing, bales of cotton, and hogheads on the wharf. The one on the right hand is a steamship under way. The bill we have before us is payable to R. Winslow, No. 453—letter A, and dated January 10th, 1839. It purports to have been engraved by Messrs. Rawdon, Wright, Hatch and Edson & Co. New York, but Mr. Harrison, one of the above firm in this place, informs us that it is nothing more than a lithograph print. It is very well executed, and calculated to deceive those at a distance. A great many of them, we are informed have been passed in the south."

FIRE AND LOSS OF LIFE.—A fire occurred in N. Orleans on the 17th inst. in the store of Mr. Bernard Doolin, Common street, which destroyed the entire contents of the building, consisting of a stock of groceries. The origin of the fire is unknown. Two individuals who slept in the building received very severe injuries by dropping from the window sill, one of whom died a few hours afterwards; a third escaped without injury. The stock was fully insured.

MAIL ROBBERY. The Knoxville, Tenn. Times of the 26th ult. says. Frequent losses of money have occurred for some time past, in the mail between this place and Jonesborough, and during the past week, measures were taken, by persons connected with the Post Office Department, to detect the robber. John W. Sasseau, deputy postmaster at Morris-town, in Jefferson county, aged about 18 years, has been apprehended on a charge of embezzling the lost money, and on Saturday was brought up for trial before the U. S. Circuit Court, in session at this place, Judges Catron and Brown presiding. But, on application of defendant's counsel, the case was postponed to the next term of the court. The presumption in favor of the guilt of the prisoner is very strong.
