

TEMPERANCE MEETING.

On Monday evening last, a regular monthly meeting of the Fayette Temperance Society was held in the Christian Church. Inspired by an abiding confidence in the justness, no less than in the importance of the cause whose interests the association is designed to promote, a large and polite audience was in attendance. This augurs well for the Temperance Reformation in this quarter, and we fondly hope, and have little doubt its progress here, although occasionally impeded heretofore, will, in future, be "onward and upward." The most indifferent and prejudiced cannot but see that the honor, happiness and most vital interests of society, demand that its triumphant vindication be maintained before the just judgment of the world; and every consideration which should move men to honorable action equally demands that its success, here and elsewhere, be aided by the efforts, and sanctified by the prayers of the Christian and patriot.

Pursuant to the request of the Society, Andrew J. Herndon, Esq., delivered the regular monthly address, and although the subject is one which is confessedly threadbare and time-ridden, nevertheless Mr. H., embodying in his address many valuable statistics and practical reflections fitted to the occasion, rendered it highly complimentary to himself, interesting to his hearers and beneficial to the cause. The address of Mr. H. being over, upon the suggestion of a member, that a number of gentlemen from a distance were present, who, if requested, would probably address the meeting, loud calls were made for Mr. De Courcy, of Glasgow. Being a "minute man" in the cause of Temperance, and having an eye single to its interests, Mr. D. responded to the call in an address abounding with many reflections, facts and arguments well calculated to fix the attention of the "fashionable drinker" to the folly and danger of his course, as well as to impress more deeply upon the minds of the members, the high moral worth of the cause for which they were embattling.

Col. Switzler, of Columbia, also responded to a call from a large number of the Society, to address them, and although almost everything had been said by the gentlemen who preceded Col. S. that could have been said in the cause of Temperance, yet he did much justice to the subject and took his seat amidst loud and deafening applause of the audience. With such champions to defend the cause of Temperance, it must and will prosper.

Col. Johnson, is travelling a la Van Buren. When last heard from he was at Wheeling, and is said to have no disposition to conceal the fact that he is a candidate for the Presidency.

Gen. N. R. Smith, is receiver of public moneys at Springfield, in place of John P. Campbell, resigned.

Mr. John Smith, has resigned the office of President of the Bank of Missouri. Reason—salary not sufficient for the support of his family. He is a candidate for the Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas, in St. Louis, and states in his letter of resignation that he resigned for the purpose of running for that office.

Maj. Gen. Scott was in St. Louis at last accounts.

DEAD—Col. George F. Bollinger, one of the oldest settlers of the State, and for many years representative from the county of Cape Girardeau.

The Loco Focos held a meeting in this place on Monday last, but did nothing more than appoint a committee to draft rules and regulations for the formation of a Democratic Association. Josiah Fisk, Esq., was appointed Secretary, and Dr. Scott a member of the committee—two gentlemen who were formally read out of the party by the "Clique" during the last canvass, for too freely expressing their opinions.

O tempora! O mores!

We yesterday called down to see Mr. Billings' Machine for breaking hemp in operation, and were greatly surprised at the simplicity and yet perfection of the whole apparatus. Two simple brakes such as have been used time out of mind by our farmers, standing side by side and united by their ends to each other, to which is attached by levers and simple yet most complete gear the necessary horse power, constitute the whole Machine. The manner of breaking is just the same as by hand, except that the break heads fall faster, and that the man who stands by has only to shove in the hemp and see it break. That greatest trouble of the farmer, fall and winter, breaking his hemp, will now be reduced to a frolic, although he raise, as he no doubt will, double or treble the usual amount. The Machine is in our estimation entirely sufficient for the purpose, cheap, substantial, nothing complex or liable to be put out of gear, and so simple in its operation that our admiration of its fitness for the intended purpose is lost in wonder that it has not before been thought of. Mr. Billings intends, as we understand, keeping it in operation for an hour or two every day for some three or four days yet to come, if he can get help, that all who wish may see its manner of breaking.
