FUNERAL OF J. D. MERRELL

Deceased met Death Without Flinching.

The funeral of Joseph B. Merrell, who died last Thursday, took place at 2 o'clock from the late residence, Rev. M. L. Butler officiating.

The deceased was conscious up to the very last. When told by the physicians that his case was hopeless he asked that a hypodermic injection might be given him to relieve his pain and was able to unbutton his own shirt sleeve for the purpose. He directed his wife as to disposition of affairs and bid his little boy good-bys, shedding a few tears as he did so, but said he had courage to die. He then took his brother William's hand and looking into his eyes expired.

A singular circumstance is found in the fact that Mr. Merrell's grandfather, Mariman Akers, aged 79, died in Kansas City Wednesday, as the family were apprised by telegram.

The committee to attend the funeral and to report suitable resolutions on the part of the bar was composed of the following members: G. B. DENISON, R. W. BLAIR, W. H. KORNGEAY, W. H. RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT. To the Honorable Wm. M. Springer, Judge of the United States court in the Indian Territory, sitting at Vinita, in the Northern district:

Your committee heretofore appointed to attend upon the funeral of the late Joseph B. Merrell, Esq., and to take such action as might be proper, do most respectfully report: That they attended the funeral in a body and that deeming it appropriate that a record should be made of the passing away of one of the officers of this court, your committee report the following resolutions:

Whereas, The scythe of Time in its relentless work has cut down from our midst Joseph B. Merrell, an attorney and counselor at law, an officer of this court, and a member of the bar of the Indian Territory, both of the courts of the United States and of the Cherokee nation, thus reminding us all of the uncertainty of life and impressing us with the importance of not putting off until tomorrow what can be done today, and of the impossibility of living our lives without its in-

fluence upon others, or of our being called before another tribunal without having to answer for the deeds done in life; therefore be it resolved, that we recognize in the loss of our brother, the sudden removal by death from our number a member of the bar in good standing upon the records of this court and one who might have attained a high position at the bar and been of great usefulness to his profession and to his fellow citizens.

That these resolutions be spread upon the records of this court and that the clerk be directed to transmit to the mother and wife of our brother, duly certified copies of the same and that copies be furnished to the press of Vinita with the request that they be published.

Appropriation Approved. The last session of the Cherokee council, passed sundry appropriation bills, liquidating expenses of the council, etc. The batch were forwarded to Washington City for the approval of the president.

Yesterday information was received at the executive office to the effect that all the appropriations had been allowed with the exception of a bill providing for the payment of a warrant drawn on the treasurer of the Cherokee nation for \$3000 and held by C. D. Markham. The original bill appropriating this amount had been lost and when the president was asked to approve he refused on the ground that the bill provided for the treasurer to pay same, and as there is no treasurer of the Cherokee nation, an incompetent agent could not recommend its payment on account of its irregularity.—Arrow.

Judge Springer's time will expire in March, and the people who know him and love him will regret deeply to see him retire from the bench. He is so thoroughly a gentleman, so incontestably above the conducting passions that sway most men, that he has to the people of the Indian Territory become the ideal judge. As ranking judge Wm. H. H. Clayton will become the chief justice of the Indian Territory court of appeals, and notwithstanding the regrets of the bench, the bar and the people at Judge Springer's retirement, there will be a pleasure in knowing that Judge Clayton will become chief justice. The mantle could fall on shoulders no more worthy, nor upon one who will reverence it more deeply. As judge of this district Judge Clayton has earned the enmities of the people of the district and of the bar of the territory. He will worthily fill the high position made more so by the eminent jurist who preceded him.—South McAlester Capital.
