OUT OF KANSAS

Came the Order To Hold Up the Appointment Of Higgins.

GILL WAS CALLED

To Topeka Where the Push Informed Him That Bill Higgins Must Not Be Appointed. Soper is Blamed for the Trouble.

From Parsons has come the following choice bit of political gossip about the holding up of the appointment of Wm. Higgins as deputy clerk of court.

"After the funeral of L. S. Crum at Oswego, Saturday, the visiting politicians exchanged the usual gossip, and among other stories was told one of a fight made on Wm. Higgins, formerly secretary of state of Kansas, by 'Cy' Leland, 'Mort' Albaugh and others of that faction of republicans. Higgins is located at Vinita, in the Indian Territory, where he is in the real estate business. He and 'Joe' Gill, judge of the federal court of that district, are great friends, and Gill thought that he might do his friend a good turn by appointing him deputy clerk. The job is worth \$150 a month.

Gill did not tell Higgins what he was going to do for him, but one day he confided the secret to George Findley, who is reported to be so good over it that he took it to Topeka and told it around pretty freely. It reached the ears of Leland and Albaugh, who began a fight on Higgins. Some time before, Higgins had written a letter to Albaugh criticizing the organization of the new state committee. He laughed particularly at Albaugh's special friend. He said Tomlinson, 'Billy' Morgan, Raney and all the crowd except Leland were 'jokes' and guessed that Leland was put on to give the committee 'character.' Of course this offended Albaugh. Higgins never was in good standing with Albaugh and Leland and now the letter settled it.

The first step was to send for Gill. He took the first train for Topeka and when the question was put to him he admitted that he had decided to give Higgins a deputy clerkship. "He is my friend," said Gill, "and although he has not asked for the place, I believe he would like to have it." "But he is not our friend," they replied. "He never has been our friend and now, look at this letter he has written about the committee. You can't please us by appointing him, and you won't please Barton. Higgins is on neither side, and it is certain that he is fighting your friends. Appoint one of our friends." Gill since his return from Kansas has been silent; George Findley denies having informed the Topeka bunch; so the buck has been passed to Piley Soper, who is now charged with having touched off the fireworks.

WILL NOT SELL.

President Youkum Denies Reports Regarding Sale of Frisco System.

The persistent rumors that the Frisco system was to be absorbed by the Rock Island has brought the following emphatic denial from President Youkum:

"The St. Louis and San Francisco railroad is not to be merged with the Rock Island nor with any other railroad. I have denied this before, and now repeat it. The Frisco is not negotiating with any railroad or representatives of syndicates for its sale. It is doing very well independently. Its stockholders are perfectly satisfied with the property as it exists."

This disposal of the reported extension of the Rock Island, so far as the Frisco is concerned, The Atchison is another which was said to be giving the attention of the Moores. President Ripley of the Atchison is quoted as saying that there will be no sale of the control of that property to Rock Island interests. He also declares that the Atchison people have not been looking for any merger with the Rock Island or any other road.

Cherokee Crop Conditions.

The following bulletin showing crop and weather conditions in the Cherokee Nation has been issued from the Oklahoma agricultural station:

Over the northern portion local showers occurred, but more rain is needed for the late corn crop generally will be a good crop; oats and flax being threshed with good yields; wheat continues a fair yield, but very light in weight; potatoes a good yield; gardens, grass, fruit and stock are doing well. Over the middle portion rain is needed to place the ground in condition for plowing, and for the late corn; haying and threshing are in progress; hay good yield; cane and kafir corn doing well; cotton not fruiting well; stock doing well, but water scarce; oats a large yield, wheat an average yield; light local showers. Over the southern portion only light showers occurred, and rain is needed by the crops; cotton is shedding fully unless damaged considerably unless rain occurs soon. A large crop of late potatoes is being planted; corn in prairie hay is being secured in fine condition; fruit is doing well; stock is not doing well.

Notice of Special Election.

Notice is hereby given that a special election by the qualified voters of the incorporated town of Vinita, Indian Territory, has been called by the Mayor and council of said town and will be held in the council room and Mayor's office of said town on the twenty-fifth day of August 1902, between the hours of 8 a. m. and sunset the same day for the following purpose:

To vote on the proposition of authorizing the issuance of bonds of said Incorporated Town of Vinita in the sum of twelve thousand dollars and to borrow money thereon to be used for the building of schoolhouses; the terms and conditions of said bonds are more particularly set forth in the Resolutions of the Council of the Incorporated town of Vinita, adopted on the 21st day of July 1902 and hereby published in full as a part of this notice.

RESOLUTION.

"Whereas, it is necessary that the incorporated town of Vinita should arrange for buildings for school purposes; and

Whereas, under the authority of the Act of Congress approved May 19, 1902 incorporated towns having a population of two thousand or more are authorized to issue bonds and borrow money thereon to be used for such purposes; and

Whereas, a census of the Incorporated Town of Vinita has been taken by W. G. Chamberlain, a suitable person duly appointed for that purpose on the 15th day of June 1902 by the Honorable Joseph A. Gill, Judge of the United States court in and for the northern district of the Indian Territory, whose sworn return to said judge shows the number of inhabitants of the Incorporated Town of Vinita to be two thousand, seven hundred and ten; and

Whereas, the total valuation of the taxable property in the incorporated town of Vinita as shown by the assessment for the year 1902 for the purpose of taxation is one million eighty thousand dollars; and

Whereas, Twelve Thousand Dollars will be ample and sufficient for the building of school houses in the incorporated town of Vinita; and

Whereas, the interest on Twelve Thousand Dollars at five per centum per annum could and would be more than liquidated by a tax of five mills upon the dollar of the valuation of taxable property in the incorporated town of Vinita as aforesaid; and

Whereas, the said incorporated town of Vinita is free from any debt obligation or liability of any kind whatsoever;

BE IT RESOLVED,

by the Council of the incorporated town of Vinita that for the purpose of building school houses within and for the incorporation of said town, the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars should be expended and in order to procure said sum it is necessary that the incorporated town of Vinita issue bonds for that purpose; therefore,

Be It Further Resolved, by the council of the incorporated town of Vinita, that under and in accordance with the Act of Congress above referred to, the following proposition be submitted to the legal voters of the Incorporated town of Vinita to be by them voted upon, on the twenty-fifth day of August 1902: to-wit:

"That bonds of the incorporated town of Vinita be issued to be used for the purpose of building school houses within and for the use of the inhabitants of the incorporated town of Vinita; said bonds to be issued in the principal sum of twelve thousand dollars in denominations to suit purchaser and to be numbered from one upward, and to be known as the Public School Building Bonds of the Incorporated town of Vinita.

The principal sum of said bonds to be paid in twenty years from the date of issue, in lawful money of the United States and from the date of their issuance to bear interest in like lawful money of the United States, said interest payable semi-annually at the rate of five per centum per annum according to the bid which shall be accepted by the council of the incorporated town of Vinita; and the advertisement for bids for said bonds shall state that bidders are requested to make proposals for four, four and one-half and five per cent bonds, preference being given to offer bearing the lowest rate of interest against the premium offered for bonds having a higher rate of interest; said bonds to be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Treasurer of this municipality, in their official capacity, and under seal of the town; to have coupons attached thereto for interest accruing upon each bond and each coupon shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Treasurer in their official capacity and attached to each bond so as to readily permit the removal of said coupons without mutilating the bond.

Said bonds shall be sold by the council of the incorporated town of Vinita by an advertisement for sealed bids at such time and in such manner as the said council may deem to be to the best interest of said town with the right to reject any and all bids, provided however that the said council shall not sell or dispose of said bonds or any of them at less than their par value.

That before the indebtedness contemplated by this resolution is incurred provision will be made by the council of the incorporated town of Vinita by ordinance, which shall be irrevocable, for an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds at the same rate, and also provide for the payment and discharge of the principal thereof within twenty years from the date of contacting the same.

That the twenty-fifth day of August 1902 be and the same be designated and set apart as a day upon which the question of issuance of the bonds as heretofore specified shall be voted upon by the qualified voters of the said Incorporated town of Vinita.

And Be It Further Resolved, that the notice of said election shall be signed by the Mayor and a member of the Incorporated town of Vinita specifying the time and place of holding said election and setting forth in full this resolution, and

notice to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published in the incorporated town of Vinita for a period of four consecutive weeks prior to said twenty-fifth day of August 1902.

And Be It Further Resolved, that the election shall be held on said day between the hours of 8 a. m. and sunset of the same day at the place designated, and conducted by election officers consisting of judges and clerks appointed by the Judge of the United States court for the northern district of the Indian Territory. The qualified voters of the incorporated town of Vinita shall vote at said election by ballot, upon which said ballot shall be printed the following words: "Shall the incorporated town of Vinita issue bonds and borrow money thereon in the sum of twelve thousand dollars to be used for the building of school houses in said Incorporated town?" "Yes" or "No."

The election shall be conducted in the manner prescribed by law and the votes shall be counted, canvassed and returned to the council of the Incorporated town of Vinita in the same manner as the votes are counted, canvassed and returned in the general town election.


