WILL FAVOR RAILROADS.

Bill to Permit Them to Take Construction Material Out of Territory.

A dispatch from Washington says the house has passed the bill introduced by Congressman Curtis of Kansas, authorizing the sale of timber and stone in the Indian territory to railroads for use outside the territory. The original law prevented the sale of timber and stone from the Indian territory to railroad companies except for use in construction of roads within the limits of the territory. The committee recommended the passage of the bill upon the showing that it was absolutely necessary for the railroad companies to secure timber and stone for the construction of their roads, part of which are in the Indian territory. The bill passed without discussion or opposition. A similar bill, introduced by Senator Cockrell, is pending in the senate.—Times.
