BOY MURDERED NEAR LENAPAH

Dastardly Deed Done by Reckless White Man Saturday Night.

One of the most fiendish and unwar-ranted cold blooded murders ever recorded in the history of the Indian Territory was that of Saturday evening when an unknown man shot Levi Gaskin, a young colored boy living near Lenapah, inflicting injuries which resulted in death a few minutes later.

Ed Linscott, an unmarried man about 32 years of age, was arrested Sunday morning about one mile west of Nowata and is being held there awaiting the preliminary hearing which will be called today. The trial was first docketed for yesterday but owing to the prosecuting witnesses being present at the funeral of the murdered boy, the hearing was postponed till today.

About dusk Saturday evening Levi and John Gaskin, colored boys about 4 and 6 years of age, were out driving up the cows when they met a stranger who demanded that they get out of the road. Without any further notice the fiend whipped out a revolver and fired at the older of the two boys, the shot taking effect in his breast. After the first shot was fired the man turned and with an oath said that if that was not enough he would give them some more just like it.

The injured boy lived but a little while. He is the son of Mrs. Gaskin, a widow woman living two miles east of Lenapah.

Up Against It.
 The Cherokee Board of Education and Supervisor of schools, Coppock, are up against a difficult problem. Of the \$100,000 appropriated by congress for public school purposes about \$25,000 will be set aside for use in the Cherokee nation, and the problem is how to make the amount fill a demand for at least \$50,000.

There are over one hundred and fifty petitions now on file asking for schools. The number of pupils enumerated in these petitions run from forty to over two hundred, and the board is confronted with the necessity of denying over half the petitions not on file, for they cannot establish more than seventy-five schools with the money in sight.

Many of these petitions, that will fall in securing schools are in neighborhoods where good school buildings have been made ready by the people, and it is a serious matter for the board to be compelled to deny petitions of this kind, but it may bring congress to a realization of the necessity to prompt action in giving Indian Territory self government or an adequate appropriation for educational purposes. -Tahlequah Herald.

A SYSTEM OF TAXATION

An Agent of the Government in the Territory to make Recommendations as to Taxes.

James H. Hollander, of Baltimore, Md., is in the city as the personal representative of President Roosevelt, says the Muskogee Times, and will likely be here for several days. He was sent to the Territory by the president to obtain data and general information which enable the Secretary of the Interior, the president and congress to act intelligently in important matters which are bound to come up in regard to the Territory when the tribal relations are dissolved in March 1906.

His principal task is to continue the work begun by Colonel Churchill several years ago in regard to school system for the Territory and, particularly, to devise a system of taxation for this country when the federal government shall have ceased to pour money into the Territory, in its paternal relations. He is known in an official way as "Special Agent for Taxation," and his recommendations will be of vast importance to the entire Territory. His report to the president will likely determine the latter more than any other one thing in the action which he will take in Indian Territory matters in a general way.

Mr. Hollander is spending most of his time at the government offices, looking into matters in a general way with the assistance of the officials. His recommendations or even his impressions of affairs here and what is needed are a profound official secret, and therefore the people of this country may expect to know but little, and that indefinitely, as to what action President Roosevelt will be likely to take.

Compsote of Green Figs.

AMERICAN WOMAN HONORED

Head of Catholic Church Confers Decoration Upon Faithful Worker Among the Poor.

Pope Pius X. has conferred upon Mrs. Thomas F. Ryan, wife of the multi-millionaire, the decoration of the cross, because of her devotion to the church and charity work in general. This is an unusual decoration for a woman to receive at the hands of the Roman pontiff. Mrs. Ryan is famed throughout the country for her philanthropic work among all classes and conditions, says the New York News. Her charity has not been limited to any one denomination, though she has been very liberal in her donations to the poorer Catholic parishes and Catholic charities generally. Only recently Mrs. Ryan had a private room set apart in one of the hospitals for telephone girls who should become sick while on duty.

In the beautiful little chapel of the Sacred Heart the people of Suffern have another evidence of the generosity of Mrs. Ryan. This cost \$50,000 and is noted for its seven exquisite stained glass windows. These depict various scenes in the life of Christ and the designs are often from the hands of the famous artist Locke.

This chapel was dedicated about six months ago by Bishop Van Vyver, who brought the Order of the Cross to Mrs. Ryan from the pope. He was the pastor of Mrs. Ryan in Richmond, Va., and it is there that Mr. Ryan is building a cathedral that will cost when finished in the neighborhood of \$500,000.
