have almost bankrupted themselves by giving large sums to have some vague, indefinite and nameless road enter the town. None but the great trunk lines are of lasting or even temporary benefit to a town. The giving of large bonuses has proven to be a delusion, and has generally been a source of loss to the people.

An Oklahoma paper carries a column of announcements of candidates for office, with a foot note to the effect that \$10 each is the price of straight announcements, but that editorial mention will be extra. Of course the inference is that any candidate may have the editorial endorsement of the paper if paid for. In other words, the paper has opinions of men touching their qualifications for office for sale to any who are willing to pay. This thing may be practiced by newspapers in Oklahoma and elsewhere, but it is unusual to see such an announcement. If the people are to follow the advice of newspapers, it should be of the unbought variety. So announcements reflect, not only on the paper in which it appears, but leaves the question as to whether such practices are not customary with other papers.
