A CLOSE RACE AT BLUEJACKET

The election at Bluejacket was lively but good natured all the way thru. A full vote was cast, and the features of the result is four ties on the board of aldermen. Of these Republicans and one Democrat received 43 votes each, and the question now is to dispose of the tie.

Bryant Cash, Democrat was elected mayor over J. W. Douthitt by a majority of six.

Geo. Hawkins, Democrat, was elected marshal by a majority of one; and Dr. Robinson was elected recorder by a majority of one. It was reported today that both Hawkins and Robinson had agreed with their competitors to swap votes, and that the Republicans kept faith and voted for the Democratic nominees, while the latter flew the track and voted for themselves.

GEORGE CONDIFF IS BADLY HURT

His Body Crushed and Mangled Beneath the Cars in Frisco Yards-- He May Recover

Tuesday evening as George Condiff was crossing the track in the Frisco yards just west of the Scraper street crossing he was knocked down and run over by a number of freight cars.

His right leg was severed just above the ankle, and he was otherwise bruised and cut about the head and body.

It is a mystery that he was not instantly killed.

Two or three trains were moving about in the yards and in getting out of the way of one of them he got in front of another one which was backing up. He was not aware of its presence, of course, and that is how he got caught.

Mr Condiff formerly was a section employe on the Frisco and was with the section crew the evening Section Foreman Crabtree was struck by an engine and instantly killed just east of the city limits. Shortly after that time he went to work with a Katy section crew and was still employed there, and was returning home from his work when this unfortunate accident befel him.

He was getting along today as well as could be expected.
