## CHARLEY PARKS

Is Caught.—New Sheriff's Force Fast Work.

Deputy Sheriffs, George Couch, Rosco Tarrent, Henry Helderman and Jack Barker came in this morning on No. 7 from the North with Charley Parks, who on last Monday evening made a criminal assault upon Reece Cravens.

Parks immediately took to the sticks and no clue to his whereabouts was known until yesterday evening when Deputy Jack Barker, alone took his trail a few miles East of Welch and landed him face to face into the hands of the other three deputies at Oswego this morning. The three deputies were just about to board the train for Baxter Springs, Kan., where they were directed by Deputy Barker to go when they met Parks about to board the same train. Parks made no effort to get away and was completely surprised when he realized his situation.

They took the first train South for Vinita and picked up Deputy Barker at Welch who had just come in to telephone them to Baxter Springs.

Parks said to Barker when he got aboard the train, "that the only difference between him and a blood hound was that the blood hound yelped and he didn't."

Parks said he was in hearing distance of Deputy Barker several times yesterday evening, and that he traveled on foot all night, last night, walking from the country east of Welch, to Oswego.

He was arraigned before Judge Farrer and his bond fixed at \$1000 which was furnished.

This is the first work of the Sheriff's force and proves that they are too fast for the average criminal.

### State Depository at Vinita.

The International Bank and Trust Co., of Vinita has been designed as one of the State depositories. This is a fitting compliment to the largest State institution in this part of the State. ## SENATOR JEFF DAVIS ASTONISHES SENATORS

Washington, Dec. 12.—Senator Jefferson Davis of Arkansas, went to the capitol today carrying a large dress suit case filled with documents he wished to have on his desk for reference during his speech on trusts. He was at his desk almost an hour before noon and before the arrival of any other senator.

When Senator Davis secured the floor and began his address all of the Senators both Democrats and Republicans were in their seats and they gave strict attention to his remarks. The galleries were filled with spectators.

Senator Davis delivered a passionate address. After declaring that his bill, rigorously enforced, would kill the trusts, with dramatic effect he challenged any senator to step forward and contest the issue with him.
