FRISCO MAY BE ASSESSED DELINQUENT PENALTY

Guthrie, Ok., Sept. 19—According to an opinion by Assistant Attorney General Spillman, the Frisco railway company is liable to pay a penalty of 18 per cent upon the second half of its 1907 taxes in Oklahoma from June 15 last.

The Frisco paid the first half of its 1907 taxes December 15 last year. During the latter part of June the road, through its attorneys, Flynn & Ames tendered the second half of 1907 taxes to treasurers of Lincoln and Grady counties, who refuse to accept the payments on the grounds that the taxes had become due on June 15, and entered the taxes as delinquent with the penalty added.

Flynn & Ames took the position that this action was unwarranted and that the second half of 1907 taxes did not become delinquent until January, 1909. The attorney general's office reverses this position and holds that where the first half of the personal taxes were paid December 15 of the year in which the levy was made, the second half becomes delinquent June 15 of the year following. All railroad property is classed as personal in Oklahoma.
