The proposition to extend the time of paying the last half of 1911 taxes for 60 days is an exceedingly popular measure and one that means relief to a large number of Craig county people. By the time the additional 60 days expires nearly every farmer in the country will have something to sell and be able to meet his tax obligation.

The commissioners of this county have called a meeting for Saturday for the purpose of extending the time when the penalty goes on for the non-payment of taxes. This conclusion was reached today and the official action will be taken Saturday. This is good news to hundreds of taxpayers in Craig county, and the prompt action of the county commissioners is to be commended.

KANSAS CITY STOCK MARKET

Kansas City Stock Yards, June 10.—Cattle buyers fired a broadside into the trade last Tuesday that knocked salesmen off their feet, but they were unable to follow their advantage. It was the public announcement that the usual summer break in medium class killing cattle would be put across, whether there was any grounds for it or not. But receipts have been running so light that, sick as the dressed meat market is said to be, there was still a demand for all that came, at slightly higher prices toward the close of the week. Consumers are said to be eating eggs, fish, or anything that is cheaper than beef, to a degree that is keenly felt by killers. But so far the slim supply of cattle has been sold at the highest summer prices ever known. The run of cattle today is light everywhere, furnishing no ammunition for buyers, but rather placing the situation in the hands of sellers, the market strong to 10 higher. Some native steers sold at \$9.10 today, not quite the full strength of the market, top native cows bring around \$7.00, heifers \$8.25, quarantine steers today \$5.00 to \$7.50, fed westerns \$5.00 to \$5.75. Five thousand stock and feeding cattle were bought here last week, as compared with six thousand same week last year. Prices declined a little, about steady today, feeders at \$5.00 to \$5.50, stock steers \$4.00 to \$5.50.

It has been largely a drawn battle in the hog pens for a week or ten days, with the advantage slightly in favor of sellers. That side has the best of it today a little, market strong to 5 higher, top \$7.67 1/2, bulk \$7.25 to \$7.65. Supply figures are bullish, showing a decrease at all the markets combined, as compared with last year, but the difference in price in favor of this year about offsets the advantage. The most able prophets claim ability to see lower prices ahead.

The sheep and lamb market has been the scene of so many horrifying encounters recently that a break of a dollar or more last week was passed over with slight comment. Natives, spring lambs, and Texas mittons all got the ax, and at the finish the best that spring lambs could do was \$8.85, native wethers \$4.80, ewes \$4.50, and Texas mittons \$4.85. The run is 5,500 today, market steady, and the only change in the quotations noted was on spring lambs which got to \$9.00. Goats bring \$3.00 to \$3.25.

Joseph Witt of Vinita, Okla., who has been handling cattle many years, came to Kansas City a few days ago and bought a carload of wethers to handle for a change. "This is an experiment, and one which I have been threatening to enter into for some time," Mr. Witt said as he looked over the saucer market. "I think it is not a good plan for a man to handle on exclusive class of stock all the time, but change about a little, so I am about to do that very thing now myself."

RIGHT CHILDHOOD IS MODEST

Well-Bred Youngster Does Not Think That It Knows Everything, Says Ruskin.

The first character of right childhood is that it is modest. A well-bred child does not think it can teach his parents, or that it knows everything. It may think its father and mother know everything—perhaps that all grown-up people know everything; very certainly it is sure that it does not. And it is always asking questions, and wanting to know more. Well, that is the first character of a good and wise man at his work. To know that he knows very little; to perceive that there are many above him wiser than he, and to be always asking questions, wanting to learn, not to teach. No one ever teaches well who wants to teach, or governs well who wants to govern; it is an old saying (Plato's, but I know not if his, first), and as wise as old. Then, the second character of right childhood is to be faithful. Perceiving that its father knows best what is good for it, and having found always, when it has tried its own way against his, that he was right and it was wrong, a noble child trusts him at last wholly, gives him its hand, and will walk blindfold with him, if he bids it. And that is the true character of all good men also, as obedient workers, or soldiers under captains.—Ruskin.
