Six hundred and one dollars were taken in Thursday at the gate alone, the greatest receipts from this source in the history of the Vinita Fair association. Considering the half tickets included in the number sold, the number of persons who got in free by climbing the fence and otherwise, there were easy 3,000 persons on the ground. No one who was present doubts this estimate.
