The Chinaman at the East.

The Alta California discusses as follows upon the advent of some seventy Chinese at North Adams, Massachusetts, at a time when the knight of St. Crispin were on a "strike" for some cause or other.

Of course, in the discussion which the daring intrusion of the seventy Celestials in North Adams, Massachusetts, is destined to excite, no other questions are to be considered but those which relate to religion and morals.

Paris Correspondence.

Mr. Edron: When, after several years of a quiet and happy life spent in the picturesque and so-called native country, I resolved to pay a visit to my native country--the paradise which good Celestials are promised to enjoy after death, but which I thought it more prudent to see once more during my life-time--I promised to send you, from time to time, a few lines expressive of my impressions in the Old World.

The first part of our travels was, unlike those of Gulliver, unattended by any exciting or romantic adventure, and we peacefully landed from our temporary but pleasant residence on board the Idaho, on the golden shores of California, (metaphorically speaking, for I never saw any golden pebbles there.)

I had formerly passed a few months in San Francisco, but notwithstanding that I had heard or read about its wealth, I would hardly realize the immense progress accomplished by the Pacific Metropolis in the space of a few years.

However, we had a most pleasant time in San Francisco, and were called upon by many friends from the Islands, some of whom came to meet us on the pier, to have the latest news from Hawaii.

The agitation which has shaken France for the last few years, and that are now felt in rapidly changing or modifications of government, are not properly assigned to the desire of the Emperor to perpetuate his power after his own decease.

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When on the other side of the Sierra, the scenery is dreary and monotonous, and I think one fully deserves to become a "Sailor" during his life-time, who has patiently trodden his weary way across the dreary desert of Salt Lake.

NEW YORK is, undoubtedly, one of the most magnificent cities of the world, and those who have lived, as I have, in some of the capitals of Europe, can not help admiring its large and noble avenues, its crowded and gayly decorated streets, and its beautiful Park, all of which can favorably compare with any city of the Old World; and I will go as far as saying that, on the whole, the plan of New York is laid on a grander scale than any metropolis I have seen.

On my arrival in France, the whole nation was in a ferment, and the newspapers were freely commenting, according to their opinions, upon the bold step the Emperor had taken in inviting the people to express by their votes the confidence they felt in the Imperial system, and their approval of the liberal changes made in the Constitution granted by Napoleon III.

It was, indeed, a bold step, and one which might have been the cause of great disasters, as it was the cause of unsuccess, and of a morbid state of commercial and financial transactions, while the definite result was unknown.
