HAWAIIAN LEGISLATURE.

SESSION OF 1886.

FRIDAY, July 16, 1886.
AFTERNOON.

The committee reconvened at 1:45 o'clock, and the consideration of items in the Appropriation Bill was continued, the following items being passed as here printed:

Landmarks, harbor Kapanuki, Waiaina, Oahu, \$500

Representative Aholo, now moved that the items "road tax, unexpended, to be expended in districts where collected," as recommended by the Committee on Finance, be taken from the table. Carried.

Representative Paehaoele moved that an item "Crane at Pelekuni harbor, \$1,000" be inserted. The motion was supported by Rep. Thurston, but on being put to vote, was lost.

Hon. C. R. Bishop moved that an item, Aid to Queen's Hospital (all receipts of Hos-
pital Tax to be paid to Finance Department \$15,000 be inserted under the head of Finance Department items, and although the Minister of Interior endeavored to have the item placed in his Department, the motion was carried, and item passed as above.

Representative Richardson moved to insert under the Finance Department the following items as recommended by the special committee to whom they were referred: Salary of Assistant Storekeeper, \$2,400; salary of Third Statistical Clerk, \$2,400; salary of Keeper steamer warehouse, \$1,200. On motion, however, the items were passed for the time being and consideration of those in the Attorney-General's Department taken up, the following being passed:

Salary of Attorney General.....\$10,000 00
Salary of Clerk of Atty General..... 5,000 00
Salary of Marshal..... 7,000 00
Salary Deputy Marshal..... 3,000 00
Salary of Clerk of Marshal..... 3,000 00
Salary of 2nd Clerk of Marshal..... 1,800 00
Salary of Sheriff of Hawaii..... 4,000 00
Salary of Sheriff of Hawaii..... 4,000 00
Salary of Sheriff of Kauai..... 3,600 00

This last item was placed originally in the bill at \$4,000, and in an endeavor to have this sheriff of Kauai receive the same salary as those on Maui and Hawaii. Rep. Lili'okalani stated that, "There was a deficit in the accounts of the sheriff of Hawaii, and those of the sheriff of Maui were also in an unsatisfactory state; but the business of the sheriff's office on Kauai was in good order, showing that a competent and trustworthy man was in charge."

Representative Thurston also aided in argument to have the amount set at \$4,000 stating, "the amount had secured the services of an official, whom the Representatives of that Island had shown to have performed his duties well—better than the sheriff of any other island." All appeals failed however and the item passed at the reduced figure printed above.

On motion the committee now rose, and reconvened in Assembly, Rep. Kannamano reporting back the work accomplished and asked leave for the committee to sit again. Report approved and request granted, and, at 4:15 the Assembly, on motion, adjourned over till 10 o'clock on the morning of Monday the 19th instant, to allow the Ministers to pay a visit to the Leper Settlement at Molo-kai, at the invitation of Hon. S. G. Wilder.

SIXTY-FOURTH DAY.
MONDAY, July 19, 1886.

The Assembly convened at a few minutes past 10 o'clock, pursuant to adjournment from Friday, the 16th inst. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Representative Kean gave notice of intention to introduce a bill to provide for the exemption of church property from taxes.

Representative Richardson offered the following resolution; which was unanimously adopted, viz:
"WHEREAS, Through the courtesy of the Hon. S. G. Wilder, the members of this Assembly were enabled to pay a visit to the Leper Settlement on Molo-kai, on Saturday, the 17th instant, by the steamer *Lilikie*; therefore be it
Resolved, That this Assembly do now tender its thanks to the honorable gentleman for his hospitality."

Representative Aholo read for the first time a bill to amend the "Auditor-General Act." After reading, he stated that that law as it now stands, prevents the salary of the Auditor-General being reduced. In the revised estimates, presented by the Ministry they had reduced it without warrant of law, and his present bill was intended to legalize that action. The bill read provides that the Auditor-General shall be paid such salary as the Legislative Assembly may appropriate. The bill was passed to its second reading.

Representative Kean offered a resolution that, all committees to whom has been referred petitions, bills or resolutions relating to items in the Appropriation Bill be requested to report in five days from the 20th inst. Approved.

Representative Aholo read for the first time, a bill to provide for a permanent settlement for one Daniel Napela, who has been a Government school teacher for forty one years, and who is now aged and feeble. The bill provides for the payment of an annuity of \$150. To second reading.

The Minister of Interior, from the Printing Committee, reported a bill to provide for lighting the city of Honolulu and its suburbs with arc and incandescent electric light, granting a franchise for same for a period of fifteen years to D. P. Smith and associates.

The Minister also, in response to a res-

olution previously offered, presented the following statement of the expenditures made by the Board of Genealogy:

On motion the above statement was ordered to be printed.

The Hon. C. R. Bishop from the Committee on Education, presented a report, signed by all the committee, on a bill "To provide for the appointment of Hawaiian youths in the Survey Department of the Government," as follows:

"The work now being done in the Bureau of Surveying is important and often difficult, requiring the greatest care and exactitude, in which inexperienced young men could not be entrusted to take a part. The Surveyor-General and his assistants could not give their time to instructing youths without detriment to the work which is now pressing upon them, and an employed young man in such an office would be an annoyance to those who might be at work, and their idleness would be damaging to themselves. The Surveyor-General is quite disposed to employ home talent in preference to sending abroad for strangers of whose qualifications and fitness he has no guaranty; and if the right kind of young Hawaiians can be found to work in the office or in the field, no doubt he will give them a chance, and no special law is required to authorize him or the Minister of the Interior to do so. Young men who wish to become first class surveyors should not only learn the higher mathematics in school, but should there study surveying also, and then if they are ambitious and conscientious they will be secure of employment. Believing the proposed Act to be impracticable and unnecessary, we recommend the Assembly to lay it on the table." Adopted.

Representative Pahia, from the Special Committee of Thirteen on Police, presented a report (signed by only six of the committee, Reps. Pahia, Aholo, Kunnamano, Kauhane, Nahinu and Palohan), and relating to the following items of pay of police: Police of Oahu, \$76,040; police of Maui, \$34,440; police of Hawaii, \$45,700 and police of Kauai, \$18,280. The committee recommend those amounts be stricken out and the following inserted: Police of Oahu, \$94,520; police of Maui, \$44,280; police of Hawaii, \$59,280 and police of Kauai, \$20,280. Total, \$218,360.

Representative Brown moved that the report be laid on the table until another report, from the same committee, could be presented. He was a member of the committee but the report just read had only been shown to him a few minutes previous and he did not agree with it. Although a member he had not been notified to attend any meeting of the committee. He noticed that the report read recommended total appropriation of \$218,360, an increase of \$40,000 over the amount asked by the Attorney-General.

Representative Dole stated that he was also a member of the committee, and Rep. Brown had been more fortunate than him, for he had not even been shown the report. He noticed that in the new schedule every deputy sheriff who is a member of this Assembly had had his salary raised.

Representative Dickey also a member of the committee also stated that he had had no notification of a meeting of the committee. He considered that those who presented this report were very unaccountable and also reckless.

The report was laid on the table.

Representative Dole from the special committee having charge of matters relating to "liquor laws," etc, presented the following report: "Your committee to whom was referred various bills upon spirituous liquors, have had under consideration a certain bill, entitled "An Act to amend section 517, article 15, of the Civil Code," and also a certain other bill, entitled "An Act amendatory of section 2, chapter 28, of the Session Laws of 1878, relating to import duties on wines." Your committee, after careful consideration, recommend that both bills pass to engrossment."

On motion the report was adopted and the bills designated were ordered to third reading on the 22nd inst.

Representative Dole, under suspension of the rules, presented a petition from one Wai'aliali, that the sum of \$10, twice paid taxes be returned to him. Referred to Finance Committee.
