ABOUT TOWN.

The Legislature adjourned at noon July 26th, till August 9th. Bain squalls and showers have delighted the thirsty earth during the week. An article on taxation from the pen of the Hon. S. N. Castle will be found on page 7. Consular flags were hoisted on Monday in honor of the birthday of the Emperor of China. The Mariposa will be due here from the Colonies en route for San Francisco on Saturday July 31st. A letter saved from the wreck of the Oregon was received by Messrs. Gonsalves & Co., by last mail. The French schooner Hammonia will be sold at auction to-morrow by Mr. L. J. Levey at Brewer's wharf. Dr. Brodie is visiting his ranch at Waialua. He has been taking some excellent photographic views. The members of the Honolulu Rifles are ordered to meet at their Armory on the evening of the 28th inst., for both business and drill. The base ball match on Saturday resulted in a victory for the Honolulu club over the Hawaii by 12 to 3. The former only played eight innings. The Kinoy has been thoroughly overhauled and takes her place on her usual route. Yesterday she left for the volcano carrying a number of tourists. The Band has provided the general public with several concerts during the past week which have proved sources of pleasure to the audiences attending. Dr. and Mrs. J. Mott Smith were to leave Washington July 15th for Europe, where they will remain for some months, visiting both England and the Continent. A Variety Company under the management of Mr. Mills, who played a successful engagement here a short time ago, will probably arrive by the return of the train. An interesting lecture was delivered on Sunday evening at Fort Street Church by the Rev. A. D. Bissell. The subject was "India" and the large audience seemed deeply interested. Mrs. S. B. Rose, Miss Grace Rose, Master Samuel W. Rose, were passengers for San Francisco per term "W. S. Brown," as also Mrs. J. E. Wiseman and daughter and Mrs. Still and daughter. Don voyage. The well known, and former favorite race horse, Langford Jr., the property of Messrs. Kymersley Bros., of Hawaii, died at the Hotel Stables during the past week, from the effect of inflammation of the lungs. The bark Star of Devon has been registered at the Custom House and now sails under the Hawaiian flag. She left this port on the 24th inst. under command of Captain A. Lovell, with a load of lumber for Jaluit. The Morning Star after being repaired, sailed for the Micronesian Islands, Saturday morning, July 24th. A large number of people attended the services which were conducted by the clergy of the city, before the vessel left. A private letter from San Francisco says, "W. H. Diamond is a candidate for Governor of California. His election would help the Islands, and in various ways benefit us. I hope he will be elected. It would help the Treaty." Mr. Atkinson, Editor of the GAZETTE leaves for a week's vacation to-day. He goes round the Island. The party will consist of Miss Ethel Wodehouse, Miss Atkinson, Miss Kapilani Atkinson, Captain Hayley and Alatan Atkinson Jr. The schooner Rosario, E. W. Christie Master, sailed July 23d, from Kahului for San Francisco with a full cargo of sugar valued at \$34,533.51. The Jno. D. Sprickets from Hilo, and the Ida Schaner from Seattle were both expected on the 24th. Attention is again directed to the notice published by Mr. Hayselden, Tax Assessor for the district of Honolulu, and tax-payers have but a few days to comply with the provisions thereof. In this issue is published officially a copy of the notice. Among the passengers on board the bark Mary Winkler, due from San Francisco about July 31st, are Prof. Martin Kellogg of the University of California, and his wife. Prof. K. visited these islands about a year ago, on account of his health, and his present trip is for the same object. A new instrument the Herophon is on view at Messrs. Hackfeld & Co.'s. It has been prepared for this market and in addition to operate and dance music gives a selection of Hawaiian airs, such as Hava Nani, Lanaukaianani March, Aloha Oe &c. As the instruments are sent all over the world, the Hawaiian airs will become popular in many lands. On the 24th inst., before a foreign jury in the Intermediary Court, Judge Judd presiding, the case of the King against Ah Sing et al charged with violating the Sabbath by irritating cane on that day, was tried. After a hearing of about five minutes with a verdict of not guilty. This case is remarkable as being the first on that charge tried before a jury in this country. News comes from Lahaina that a native named James Kumana, a resident of Lahaina has been missing since July 23d. On the evening of the 23d the wife left the house and on returning the next morning she discovered blood on the floor, but no blood stained cane knife was found, but no clue to the missing man had been discovered up to the date of the mail leaving. Yesterday afternoon Mr. F. Horn, confectioner, sent a can of delicious ice cream to the GAZETTE office, which was indulged in by "all hands," who pronounced it of superior quality and flavor. It disappeared on short notice, which was evidence that its quality was first class. A Sudden Death. A sad occurrence happened on Saturday morning last, in the sudden death of Abraham Bolster Jr., a compositor in the GAZETTE office, which took place in a cell in the Station House. It appears from statements that on Friday evening about 7:30 p.m. the deceased, was in company with a young man and by some means received a mortal wound on the head. He was taken to the police station in an insensible condition. He was looked up as being intoxicated in one of the lower cells. Shortly after seven the next morning Officer McKeague noticed that something was wrong and sent for the young man's father. Shortly after his arrival an examination was held by Drs. Martin and McWayne, and a jury was impaneled which, after viewing the body adjourned till this afternoon. The funeral took place on Sunday at 10 a. m. from the residence of the grandfather of the deceased. The funeral services were conducted by Pastor Cruzan, and under the auspices of Honolulu Typographical Union No. 37. The Electric Light. Mr. Berger's exhibition of the electric light came off last Wednesday evening. The lights were placed on King street, on Richard street, in Palace yard and in the yard of the Government Buildings. The jets were turned on shortly after seven and threw a brilliant light with strong shadows. Palace square was well lighted up and the military who marched in and fell into line were distinctly seen along the whole line. After a short drill, the army marched into the square of Ahlohani Hale, and being ordered to fall out paraded to ten and ice cream for the benefit of the Kanakapili Church fund. H B M S. Pelican. H.
