

COMMERCIAL.

HONOLULU, NOVEMBER 16, 1886. From a lengthy article in the San Francisco Bulletin of October 27, on the "Sugar Outlook," we clip the following paragraphs, giving the latest information regarding the beet-sugar crop of Europe, and the supplies on hand in the principal sugar markets of the world: "Sugar continues unusually low all over the world, as compared with prices a few years ago; and it is becoming a question of interest whether there is to be any material improvement in value very soon. Crushed Sugar at 60 is certainly cheap, viewed in the light of recent history. It is not necessary to go back many years to find a quotation of 16c. There are scores of housewives in this city who thought they were doing well to get 6 lbs of Crushed Sugar for a dollar. It was then 76c per lb by the barrel. Now the figures are completely reversed. Sugar is 60c per lb by the barrel and retailers are glad to give 16 lbs for a dollar. "Hawaiian Sugar planters have complained much in the past two years, but really they are the best off of all, because in addition to the prices which the Cuban planter gets for his product, they reap the duty which the Government exacts on their sugar. It so happens that our sugar refiners are largely interested, directly and indirectly, in the cultivation of Sugar at the Hawaiian Islands. In making contracts with the planters, they are therefore dealing with themselves to a great extent. To cut off all competition from outside sources, and to make things doubly secure for themselves, their contracts with the Hawaiian planters are based upon the cost of dutiable Sugars delivered in the United States. If, therefore, they do not get more than the refining charges on the Sugar handled by them at the refineries, they have no benefit of the duty to the full extent that they are interested as planters. They had the wisdom to foresee this condition of things upon the adoption of the reciprocity treaty ten years ago. But for this fact, it is probable that Sugars would have sold at much less prices in this market in the past decade. Under the fostering care of such advantages, the product of the Hawaiian Islands has been more than doubled in this interval. The crop out in the past twelve months has yielded upwards of 100,000 tons of 200 lbs. or over 200,000,000 lbs. and the outlook for the ensuing crop is equally favorable. "A prominent element in the late depression in the Sugar markets of the world has been the cheapness with which Beet Sugar has been produced. It is a question whether economy in that line has not reached its utmost limit for the present. Everything in the way of labor saving machinery it has been possible for man to invent has been applied, and the manipulation of the Beet product has been reduced apparently to the lowest possible figure. A German trade paper with an unimpeachable reputation under date of September 24th, gives returns of eleven Sugar factories in Germany, four of which show that they came out square, six factories worked at a loss, and only one paid a dividend. It is further reported, that of all of the Polish factories, only two worked a dividend of three per cent each, while all the rest worked at a loss. These figures are not very encouraging, and those interested are not going to stand a duplicate of many such seasons. As to the current season's Beet crop, the September report of M. There may be further consolation to the same class by the fact that the total for September 1st is 355,000 tons less than on the 1st of January."

Gazette's Kohala Letter. KOHALA, Nov. 13th, 1886. EDITOR GAZETTE.—Yesterday (Friday) between 8 and 9 p. m., all the trash houses belonging to the Kohala Sugar Co., were burned down. This is another case of incendiarism, which seems to be the order of the day in this district; of course the guilty party will never be found out by our imbecile police force. This is the second time the trash houses of the Kohala Mill have been burned; those of the Star Mill have been burned down twice and of the Halawa Mill once, and not in one instance has it been found out who was the perpetrator of the deed. The manager's offer large rewards for the conviction of the culprits, and the police goes quietly to sleep, leaving it to the planters to take two demijohns filled with kerosene down again. Altogether the conditions here are getting worse and worse. Not a day goes except lights, stabbing affairs and drunken rows are reported. As nobody ever gets punished, nobody cares. Last Wednesday, a Portuguese teacher of the Government school and told the teacher (who is minister of the English church) that he did not want his son, who is a pupil in the school, to do certain work, which he was ordered to do. When the man was told to mind his own business, he started to beat the teacher with a black snake and gave him some ugly cuts on his head. And I could fill a column with instances of this kind, which some few years ago never were heard of here. On whom does the blame fall on then? Not so much on the man who is called sheriff or judge as on the Government, who put these men in office, men who every day have to own up to their incompetency. Right under their noses the Chinamen are distilling gallons of oleohalo, flooding the country with it, peddling it for 50 cents per bottle, and making all the native plantation laborers gloriously drunk. The police refuse to interfere, as the Chinamen have threatened to shoot on them if they do. And actually a few nights ago a celestial fired a pistol in the air, where a policeman tried to take two demijohns filled with oleohalo from him. The policeman disappeared of double quick time, and the Pake went off with his liquor. Outside of Honolulu, this is the largest tax-paying district perhaps except Wailuku, and the same, which the people get from the Government, are permitted to keep the roads in order at their own expense, public sold oleohalo, a licensed grog shop, and free opium, and besides these blessings a Government doctor, who never attends to his duty, and a judge, who punishes cattle thieves with a fine of \$5, and police force, which upholds the law in the district in such a manner, that everybody is obliged to travel with a pistol in his pocket.

AMERICAN.

New York, Oct. 27.—All the political parties held meetings last evening in various parts of the city. NEVADA CITY, Oct. 26.—Further accounts of the bursting of the cannon at the Democratic meeting in French Corral the other night show that Senator Cross was bending over and gesticulating to the crowd, whom he wished to stand further back, when the cannon burst and a piece flew over the Senator's head. Had he been standing erect it would have killed him. Charles Bradford, the man killed, was the gunner. He knew his danger, as the wad was too big for the cannon, but he would not stand further back, as he thought the crowd would be blown off his feet, and he picked up at a distance of twenty four paces from the rest of the remains. Strange to say, the features were natural, and without scar or wound. WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—Hon. Nicholas M. Bell, Superintendent of Foreign Mails, has sent out for the Post Office Department, master-General, showing the operations of that office during the last fiscal year. The total weight of letters dispatched to foreign countries by sea was 500,198 pounds, and of papers, 2,367,583 pounds. The estimated number of letters sent to foreign countries by air was 2,800,285, and of papers, 4,749,064 newspapers were sent, and 26,700,805 was received. The cost of the sea transportation service during the year was \$357,443, as against \$331,903 last year. Superintendent Bell recommends that compensation be paid to the United States for the regulated in accordance to their rank. New York, Oct. 25.—The preparations for the unveiling of the statue of "Liberty" on the 28th instant, are progressing rapidly. New York, Oct. 26.—The Academy of Music was gayly decorated to-night, in honor of the French delegates to the unveiling of the statue of Liberty, who were tendered a reception by the City of New York, in the Plazamonie. A distinguished audience was present, including a very large representation from the French colony. M. La Fou, president of the circle, presided, and an address of welcome was made in French by Frederick R. de la Roche, who spoke in English on behalf of the American committee attending a hearty welcome to the city to the nation and to all.
