Latest Foreign News!

By the arrival of the O. S. S. Zealandia,
Dates to March 15th, have been received.
The following is a summary:

PEACE OR WAR.

BERLIN, March 6.—The North German
Gazette says: The results of the Alsace elections
have strengthened the war party in France.
If war should break out, it is announced that
those provinces would be mainly responsible.
Germany, being bound to take this fact into
account, would not respect the liberality
extended to Alsace-Lorraine after the war of
1870.

St. Petersburg, March 7.—The *Kresnie*
Sitting says: Letters from St. Petersburg
state that the general hatred of Germany
and the popularity of France are becoming a
sort of violent epidemic in Russia.

LONDON, March 7.—It is reported here as
an absolute fact that Italy has made a treaty
with Germany and Austria. If France and
Russia attack Germany, Italy is to move on
France. If Austria and Russia have a serious
conflict Italy is to aid Austria with her fleet.
For this aid she is to get Trentino and Cor-
sica, and Nice and Savoy are to be hers if the
war is general.

LONDON, March 8.—It is rumored that an
agreement has been arrived at between Rus-
sia and Austria for the settlement of the
differences relative to the Balkan States.

St. Petersburg, March 8.—The Govern-
ment has sent secret instructions to all the
Government railway inspectors on the sub-
ject of the mobilization and transportation
of troops.

VIENNA, March 8.—The *Freidenblatt* ad-
vices the Bulgarian Regents to retire and
allow the country to secure a peaceful ar-
rangement with Russia. Other semi-official
papers give similar advice. It is believed
that they are inspired by the Government to
advocate such a course.

It is reported that the Emperor Francis
Joseph, in a private conversation, denied that
Russia had formerly withdrawn from the
triple alliance.

BRUSSELS, March 8.—One of the ablest offi-
cers of the Belgian army publishes a pam-
phlet in which he cites numerous reasons
which he holds conclusive of showing that
France, in the event of another Franco-Prus-
sian war, will invade Germany through Bel-
gium territory.

PARIS, March 8.—The *Temps* and the *Journal*
des Debats semi-officially contradict that
a treaty of alliance has been signed by Ger-
many, Austria and Italy.

LONDON, March 9.—The feeling this morn-
ing is that the peace of Europe will be, after
all, maintained this year, more from military
reasons than from other considerations.

New York, March 9.—The *Star's* London
cable special says: M. Destiel, the Russian
Ambassador, was the bearer of a fresh com-
munication from the Czar to Lord Salisbury
yesterday on the Eastern question. The
interview was protracted. The Russian com-
munication is understood to be pacific in tone
and to open the way to a resumption of
negotiations between the great Powers for
the appointment of a successor to Prince
Alexander. M. Destiel informed Lord Salis-
bury that a similar communication had been
sent to Vienna. Russia is willing to give
England carte blanche in Egypt in conser-
vation of the abandonment of English oppo-
sition to Russian plans in the Balkan States.

BERLIN, March 10.—A dispatch to Berlin
from St. Petersburg telegraphed here to night
asserts positively that Russia does not intend
to occupy any part of Bulgaria. Russia's
attitude, according to the sources, which are
evidently inspired, is dictated by solicitude
for Bulgaria. The reserve that has charac-
terized Russian diplomacy recently is due
solely to this cause. Austria and England,
acting in concert, have
