

COMMERCIAL.

Business remains quiet, and dullness, outside of foreign shipments, prevails. The shipment of supplies to the other islands is fair. Money is tight, and collections are hard to make.

In many of the planting districts there is a scarcity of rain which seriously interferes with the planters in some localities, where fencing the cane is the principal mode of conveyance.

Stormy weather is reported from the other islands, making it difficult to land or receive freight. At Kipahulu the Likilike had a boat pitched into the surf and the load of freight pitched into the boiling surf, which was rescued in a damaged condition.

The Water Front. The absence of foreign vessels in the harbor loading for San Francisco has been noticeable during the week.

The arrivals have been the barkentine Discovery and barkentine on the 13th and barkentine W. H. Dimond on the 14th, with full freights of assorted merchandise.

The barkentine J. A. Falkenberg, after discharging, will take in sugar for San Francisco. A survey has been held on the bark Kalkana, and the vessel has been found to be sound.

The schooner Ebnkai, of the Pacific Navigation Co.'s fleet, has sailed for Japan with stores and supplies for the company's station there. The Ebnkai is in command of Capt. Macy.

The brig Allie Rowe has been delayed, but will sail during the week for Hongkong, where she will undergo repairs and be reclassified.

The French iron bark Julia is discharging coal near the Wilder steamship wharf. The Discovery is discharging at the P. M. wharf; the Calbarren at Brewer's wharf; the W. H. Dimond at the Oceanic wharf, and the Geo. C. Perkins at Brewer's wharf.

The Hawaiian war vessel Kaimiloa was again taken upon the Marine railway last week to have her screw refitted, and was launched on Saturday last.

The schooner Ke Au Hou is driving a lively trade in the cattle business between Molokai and Honolulu.

LATE FOREIGN NEWS!

EUROPEAN.

PARIS, April 3.—Austria, the Protector, delegate to the Reichstag, who was expelled from Germany, has arrived at Pagny.

RUSSIA, April 2.—It is rumored here that an outbreak has occurred at Rutschuk; that the Bulgarian War Minister had been attacked, and that two regiments had revolted at Kirkiendel.

BERLIN, April 2.—The three persons who were concerned in the attempt to assassinate the Czar by means of bombs in St. Petersburg on March 13th, were hanged Thursday morning.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 30.—A wholesale merchant in St. Petersburg, reported to have worth millions, has been shot and killed by a man to whom he refused to give 80,000 roubles toward the Nihilist fund.

BRITISH. BOMBAY, April 7.—Mr. Hyne, an English civil engineer, has gone to Cabul, capital of Afghanistan, at the request of the Amerer, to consult with him about the construction of a railway from Cabul to Herat.

DUBLIN, April 7.—Father Keller, the imprisoned Catholic priest, has been appointed Canon of Clonoy by the Bishops of the Diocese.

LONDON, April 6.—At a meeting in Chelsea to-night a letter was read from Gladstone in which he said: "Our adversaries have availed themselves of the fact that I have taken a large share in placing the Irish problem as a question of practical politics before the country to plead it as a personal affair, and that it is not a true conviction, and that the people are not in genuine sympathy with the justice of the Irish demand."

DUBLIN, April 6.—The attempt of the agent to compromise with the tenants on Lord Lansdowne's estate has failed, and the work of evicting the tenants who refuse to pay rents is demanded and will be resumed April 30th.

LONDON, April 5.—The second reading of the Irish Finance Act Amendment bill was moved in the House of Commons this afternoon by Balfour, Chief Secretary for Ireland.

LONDON, April 4.—A Lahore paper announces that the Amerer of Afghanistan is seriously alarmed at the discovery that a number of native tribes are combining against him, and has appealed to the Indian authorities for help and advice.

DUBLIN, April 2.—Of the new Land bill introduced in the House of Lords, William O'Brien says: "It is not a bill that is meant to pass. It is a show bill and a sham. If I were a landlord I should regard the Land bill with far greater terror than the tenants regard the Coercion bill, but I never meant to pass it. It is only a sop to the Birney and Cerberus and a salve to the uneasy conscience of the Coercionists."

LONDON, April 1.—In the House of Commons to-night the Closure was carried by a vote of 361 to 253, and the first reading of the Coercion bill was acted upon without division.

QUEENSTOWN, April 1.—The Dauntless sailed for Southampton to-day, where she will be overhauled prior to going on a cruise along the coast of Norway. She will afterwards visit the Azores, then proceed home.

LONDON, April 1.—The Queen arrived at Cannes to-day. Her Majesty drove from the railway station to the villa in an open carriage without riders. She was escorted by a guard of honor, a force of mounted gendarmes and the Cannes Fire Brigade.

QUEENSTOWN, March 31.—The Coronet proceeded to Cowes at 9:30 this morning.

LONDON, March 31.—The Cabinet have decided to abandon the cause of the Irish Criminals Amendment bill, which provides for confining venue from Dublin to London in certain cases of criminal trials, thus practically removing the greatest cause of the Liberal Unionist opposition to the bill.

IN THE HOUSE OF LORDS to-night, Earl Cardigan (Conservative) presented a bill, providing for the purchase of the land holdings, in other words, for the abolition of the system of ownership created by the Act of 1881.

STURKEY, N. S. W., March 30.—In the Colonial Assembly to-day a stringent bill was introduced for the protection of the Colony against foreign criminals. Shipmasters landing any such criminals are made liable to a penalty of five years' penal servitude and their vessels to be forfeited.

NEW YORK, March 30th.—The challenge issued by the Royal Clyde Club to race the yacht Thistle for the America Cup was accepted yesterday. Commodore J. D. Smith, G. S. Haight, and Richard A. Vice-Commodore Charles Haight, comprising the committee appointed to take action regarding it, met shortly after noon, when the communication from W. York, Secretary of the challenging club, was read and considered.
