EUROPEAN.

SWAKIM, May 2.—Deserters report that the Hadendowa Arabs, assisted by other friendly tribes, have destroyed the Soudanese rebels from Kassala, and have captured Osman Digna and Abu Girgu.

PARIS, May 4.—The *Dissertation* *Sicte* dismisses as fictitious the ostensible reasons given by the German press for General Waldersee's tour along the frontiers of Alsace-Lorraine, and says: Everything warrants us in thinking and saying that he is solely studying the best points of concentration for the German troops in proximity to our eastern frontier. We are surprised that the German papers should seek to mislead us in regard to the object of his journey.

LAHORE, May 4.—It is reported that the troops of the Ameer of Afghanistan were recently routed near Jellalabad, that Kheist I and Ghilzai had been captured, that Ghuzan is surrounded and that the insurgents threaten Candahar. It is also reported that in a second battle near Aruf the Ameer's Colonel Sekander Kahn and 400 men were killed. The insurgents suffered equal losses. The Governor of Herat sent another demand to the Ameer for re-enforcements. He stated the Russians are advancing their posts, thereby exciting the Afghans. Traders arriving from Herat report that the Russians have reached the pillars erected by the boundary commission.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 4.—The seven prisoners condemned to death for connection with the recent plot to assassinate the Czar are all men. The others who were convicted of complicity in the plot received various sentences to penal servitude, the most severe being twenty years. All the prisoners except student Oulianoff behaved quietly during the trial. It is possible that the Czar may mitigate some of the sentences.

LONDON, May 4.—Yesterday the *Daily News* contained a telegram from its Liverpool correspondent stating that the police were on the tract of the Irish dynamite conspirators and that many arrests and sensational trials might be expected soon. To-day's *Standard* contains a New York dispatch telling of the existence of a fund for "celebrating the Queen's Jubilee in a manner becoming to Irish Nationalists," adding that explosives have already been shipped, and that action may be expected before the 4th of July.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 4.—The Czar, Czarina and all the principal members of the imperial household will depart on the 15th inst. for Cherkask, the capital of the Don Cossack country. The visit is to be made for the purpose of witnessing the grand Don Cossack military parade and war games, and to entertain the Don Cossack notables. Troops are already being dispatched to take up positions along the line of railway to be traveled by the imperial party so that the entire route will be guarded.

PARIS, May 5.—It is reported in consequence of the refusal of the European powers to take part in the Paris exhibition that the French government contemplates postponing the opening until 1890, in order to disassociate the exhibition from the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the revolution.

PARIS, May 4.—Anti-German demonstration continue to be made in various sections of the city. A procession carrying a banner inscribed "To Berlin" to-day marched to the Palace Elysee, where it was dispersed by the police. Twelve persons were arrested.

LONDON, May 5.—The *Telegraph* describes the anti-German demonstration in Paris last Tuesday as serious. It says: A mob in the vicinity of the Eden theatre, where Wagner's "Lohengrin" was being performed, shouted: "A bas l'Allemande!" (Down with Germany), "Vive la France!" "A Berlin!" (On to Berlin), "A bas Bismarck!" (Down with Bismarck), "Give back our clock!" (referring to Strasburg). Last evening the demonstrations were renewed, mostly composed of students and gamins, who marched about shouting. They halted in front of the Army and Navy club and there cried out: "Vive l'armee Francaise!" "Vive Boulangier!" "A Berlin!" Another mob went to the building occupied by the Russian embassy, shouting: "Vive la France!" "Vive la Russie!" "Vive l'Alliance Russo Francaise!" The leaders of the mob then proposed to their followers to march to the German embassy. The mob then proceeded in the direction of the Place de la Concorde, singing the air: "Lampions," to the words of the song "Nos Pendules" (our clocks), but the crowd was stopped by the police and turned away before it could reach the German embassy. The mob then returned to the Place de l'Opera and there gradually dispersed. The manager of the Eden theatre has decided to suspend the performance of "Lohengrin" and other productions of Wagner in that place of amusement.

The Paris government has decided to prosecute the publishers of the *La Revanche* for publishing an article entitled "Down with the Germans," as calculated to arouse a warlike feeling among the French people against the Germans.

MOSCOW, May 5.—The Berlin correspondent of the *Moscow Gazette* says the German military authorities are training mastsiffs to hunt French outposts in the event of war, also falcons and other birds of prey are being trained to chase carrier pigeons should the latter be employed by the French.

ODessa, May 5.—A Russian lunatic

ran amuck here to day and stabbed six Jews, killing two. He was arrested in a restaurant, where he attacked and injured a Jewish waiter. A mob of Jews tried to lynch him, but was unsuccessful.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 5.—A semi-official denial is given to the report that the negotiations of the English and Russia commissions on the Afghan boundary question have failed. The commission holds its first formal joint meeting to day.

MONTE CARLO, May 5.—The occupiers implicated in the recent gambling swindle have been tried. The one who dealt the cards was sentenced to eighteen month's imprisonment, while the others were severely reprimanded.

Canada and the Hawaiian Trade.

The following Chicago dispatch, April 13th, appears in the San Francisco *Chronicle* of the 14th: The *Times* Ottawa special says: The Dominion Government has abandoned all idea of extending trade relations between Canada and the Hawaiian Islands. Last year a Commissioner, Colonel Walker Powell, was sent out to Honolulu to collect information on the subject, and to ascertain what could be done with a view to securing closer commercial relations with Hawaii. He has reported the failure of his mission to Sir John Macdonald. He represents that the renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty between the United States and Hawaii precludes all possibility of Canada making any arrangement in that direction. He found the white population and the Government of King Kalakaua strongly in favor of annexation to the United States, although the King and native Princes were opposed to it. Colonel Powell reports that had there been no arrangement with the United States, the Hawaiian Government would gladly have made a treaty with Canada.
