

COMMERCIAL.

HONOLULU, JAN. 3, 1888.

The receipts of produce during the week by the inter-island fleet consisted mostly of sugars.

The arrivals from foreign ports, were the San Pablo and the W. S. Bowne from San Francisco, and departures, H. B. M. S. Conquest for Panama, the Mary Winkelman and the C. D. Bryant for San Francisco, the San Pablo and U. S. S. Junia for Hongkong.

The Mary Winkelman and the C. D. Bryant took large cargoes of the united value of \$213,284.13.

The imports of gold at New York, January 1st to November 19th, were \$36,575,942; the exports \$2,883,338; the imports of silver for the same time \$1,889,295, the exports \$9,828,841.

The wool-dealers and wool-growers of the United States represent a capital of over five hundred million dollars. A conference recently held, issued an appeal to the agriculturists, manufacturers, wage-earners, tradesmen and merchants against a reduction of the tariff on wool.

The city of San Francisco gives a total of new buildings for the present year to date of December 31, 1,686 valued at \$6,665,216 as against 1,174 of a value of \$5,888,287 for the same time in 1886.

The Commercial Herald and Market Review says of the outlook in San Francisco: Land, both in city and country, is fast increasing in value; incomes are doubling up, and all signs point to as great general prosperity here as can be found in any city of the Union.

From November 28th to December 3d, inclusive, the shipments of lumber from Puget Sound during 10 weeks, valued at \$138,056. During the same time, there were also shipped 10,630 tons of coal valued at \$50,150.

The Kaunilua takes the old buoy to Eleela. The barkentine Mary Winkelman sailed for San Francisco on Wednesday, with 13,794 bags sugar, valued at \$77,000.

The bark James A. King arrived at Kahului on the 26th, 28 days from Port Townsend, with 482 M feet lumber for her owners, Wilder & Co.

The O & O steamship San Pablo, Capt. Reed, arrived about 7 o'clock yesterday morning, 67 days and 17 hours from San Francisco. She had on board Robert Garrett, the American railway magnate, and party, besides other passengers. There are about 600 in the steerage in transit. The San Pablo will resume her voyage for Yokohama at noon to-day. She is docked at the Oceanic Company's wharf.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The United States Marine Hospital Bureau still considers it necessary to maintain quarantine for cholera against vessels from Italy.

Russia is bad off for a loan, and will be compelled to accept the stringent terms of the French bankers, the Berlin market being closed to her.

The Emperor of China, having learned that Corea was not going to pay any more tribute to China, issued a proclamation declaring the independence of Corea and prohibiting the receipt of any further tribute. This is an instance of the coon coming down with remarkable gracefulness.

The telephone will never be right till it has a battery for knocking down people who ring up a number and then turn away, while the person rung up repeatedly shouts his number at the transmitter without response, only to be rung up again after hanging up the receiver in disgust.

The information conveyed to the Government by the Hawaiian Consul at Valparaiso, Chile, regarding the existence of cholera in that country, is of grave importance. With vessels frequently dropping in here from the South American coast, it is to be presumed that our authorities will be vigilantly on guard against the introduction of the scourge.

Mr. Gibson is writing a book to "tell it all"—that is, all that suits him. By the time it is out, the "old man" will be in ancient history, so far as concerns any influence he counts on having in Hawaiian affairs. Parts of the world move as well as the whole globe, and it takes a Napoleon to catch on again after losing his place on the wagon.

A jury before Chief Justice Sedgwick in the Supreme Court at New York recently rendered a verdict in favor of C. W. Dickel & Co. for horses used by Gen. Hancock's staff at the obsequies of Gen. Grant, in pursuance of an order given them by the late Gen. Lloyd Aspinwall, who acted as Aide to Gen. Hancock at that occasion. The United States Government had refused to pay the claim, there being no proof of Gen. Aspinwall's authority to order the horses. Dickel & Co. then sued Gen. Aspinwall's estate with the above result.

SOMETHING like a sensation has been caused in Britain and the United States by the appearance of an article in the St. John Globe, advocating the annexation of the Dominion to the United States, the editor and proprietor of that paper, John V. Ellis, being a member of the Dominion Parliament. The real significance of the incident is not observed in the discussions we have seen in the American press. It is not in the fact that a member of Parliament advocates annexation, but that a well-known advocate of annexation is a member of Parliament. Mr. Ellis has been advocating annexation in his influential paper, off and on, during the past twenty years, and that he should be chosen as a representative of a large commercial constituency is really significant.

HABEAS CORPUS. BEFORE CHIEF JUSTICE JUDD. A writ of habeas corpus was issued by the Chief Justice this day between 11 and 12 o'clock noon, on behalf of Look Mai, Chun Ho, Ah Moi and Koi Chun, four Chinese women, passengers on voyage from San Francisco to Hongkong.

The writ was issued at the instance of Lee Fook through Mr. V. V. Ashford, attorney for the applicants.

The petition of the attorney sets forth: that the petitioner, Look Mai, is the wife of Lee Fook, now of Honolulu; that petitioner Chun Ho is the wife of Ah Lai, son of said Lee Fook and Look Mai, now a resident of San Francisco; that Ah Moi and Koi Chun are daughters of said Lee Fook and Look Mai; that the petitioners are at present restrained of their liberty and detained on board the steamer San Pablo lying in the harbor of Honolulu by Captain Reed, master of the said vessel; that the cause of prevention of such said restraint is not positively known to the petitioners; but is believed to be an agreement on the part of said Captain Reed with third parties who had no right of control over petitioners, to land them at Hongkong against their wish; that there is no warrant or other process, so far as petitioners have ever heard, under which they are held or are claimed to be held; therefore petitioners pray that a writ of habeas corpus may issue directed against the said Captain Reed, master of the San Pablo, commanding him to produce the said petitioners before the Court in Honolulu, and there answer why said petitioners are restrained of their liberty.

Mr. Hartwell, counsel for Messrs. Aseo and God. Kim, Chinese Consular Agents, moved that the writ be quashed, being addressed to the Marshal and not Captain Reed, of the San Pablo, who was alleged to be restraining these women illegally; and also because the petition contained no averment that there was reason to believe that the women would be carried out of the jurisdiction of the Court or suffer some irreparable injury before compliance with a writ of habeas corpus can be enforced.

The Chief Justice said that on reflection, he thought the writ ought to have been directed to the captain, and that there should have been an averment that there was reason to believe that the women would be carried out of the jurisdiction, but that there were now here, and the San Pablo had left the port, the Court would deny the motion and would hear the case, but the Court declined to place the women in custody of the petitioner, Lee Fook, unless he showed that he was legally entitled to it. Lee Fook and Look Mai were called and examined on oath.

Further hearing of the case will be had to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

FRIDAY, December 30th. HABEAS CORPUS—BEFORE CHIEF JUSTICE JUDD. In the matter of the petition of Look Mai, Chun Ho, Ah Moi and Koi Chun.

Hearing of the case continued from yesterday.

The Court orders the petitioners discharged with costs.

Mr. Hartwell, counsel for the Chinese Consular Agents, moves the Court to commit Lee Fook summarily for perjury. The Court declines to do so.
