

THE MOLOKAI WATERWORKS.

Health and Sunshine—Progress of the Pipelayers.

"Here we are again," with a few lines to inform the general public that the devoted band of toilers which Supt. Wilson inveigled into the wilds of the Waikolu valley are not yet dead, but still enjoy good health and spirits.

The weather has been really enjoyable during the past few weeks, the days being bright and pleasant with moderate trades blowing, and at night the star-spangled vaults above glistening and gleaming brilliantly through the cloudless empyrean.

Superintendent Wilson's party is still camped here at Waikolu, but little work is being done near the camp, the points of labor being situated either a couple of miles up the valley or else at the "Summit," near the entrance to Waihoano valley, at Kalaupapa, three and one-half miles away.

In advance of the completion of the main supply line, provision is now being made by Superintendent Wilson for the individual supply, which has been so much desired, and has obtained estimates which call for a total of about 100 taps.

The camp quarters, on the 12th inst., were honored by the presence of Dr. J. Brodie and Dr. Wood, members of the Medical Commission appointed by the Government to investigate the condition of the sick at the Leprosy Settlement, and as Superintendent Wilson was "at home," the visitors found the tent-latch-string out, as usual, and they received the attention and care which their appearance, so far from home, presaged.

Dr. Emerson seemed both surprised and pleased at the progress made, and so expressed himself before leaving Kalaupapa. "I heard later that, on the ride over, he had a very narrow escape from serious injury, his horse shying and throwing him off head first.

The Crisis in France.

The overthrow of the Tirard Ministry, after an existence of a few weeks, is another illustration of the slow progress which the French are making in political education.

Fifteen hundred feet of snowsheds near Cheyenne were burned lately, and a delay of ten hours was occasioned to the trains. The wires were all destroyed.

Laupahoehoe Notes.

We of Laupahoehoe have come to the conclusion that our magnificent local happenings should be publicly recorded as those of Hilo are, not by a pen of such grace, dignity and power as that of your Hilo correspondent, but none the less anxious to weary the general public by persistence and detail.

The new Government, with the penetration characteristic of wise men, recognizing the growing importance of our village as a center of industry and commerce, have made some valuable additions and improvements to our system of public works.

But better than this, the Government is proposing to give us a complete system of water works, so that we may have fountains playing in our front yards and duck ponds stagnating in the back.

Having secured this benefit, we will probably have developed assurance enough to ask the Government to light our streets by electricity, with a big headlight on the bluff 400 feet above and overlooking the village.

A deal of good work has been done on our roads since the advent of this new regime and the appointment of the Road Board. Throughout a considerable portion of the district it is actually possible to gallop four abreast along the road where formerly it was crowded for one going on a walk.

Local judicial matters have also come in for a share of the general improvement, in the appointment of one of our prominent citizens as District Judge, and since he has come into office we have wondered more than ever how we managed so long to put up with the incompetence and injustice of his predecessor.

But not alone in material matters does Laupahoehoe indicate life and progress. We have a Longfellow Society, devoted to the study of that popular author and holding meetings weekly—dependent on the weather.

In connection with this Society a weekly paper is conducted, which furnishes no small amount of amusement to the hearers and is one of the most popular things of the evening.

The railroad is a foregone conclusion, and thus Hilo's fondly cherished hope of many years is again scattered to the winds. Our heart goes forth in tender sympathy to the little village that would be a city, and to the unfortunate owners of town lots, in the wilderness of lava flows, on which, in dreams, they had built such stately residences for themselves.


