Birthday Recollections.

Friday was the forty-second natal anniversary of Mr. H. W. Schmidt, of the firm of Messrs. H. Hackfeld & Co., Consul for Sweden and Norway.

The presence of the rails, which are laid close to the mauka side of the road, reduces what was originally rather a narrow driveway, to a strip altogether unsuited to the large amount of travel which passes over it.

The recurrence of murders on the island of Hawaii is becoming unpleasantly monotonous. The sparseness of the population over large districts, the roughness of country and the poor means of communication in many places, the small numbers and scattered locations of the police, and possibly, in some instances, the inefficiency of a portion of them, all conspire to render the commission of crime easy, and prompt pursuit of the criminal comparatively difficult.

The letter represents Tamasese's forces, since removal to the Atua district, to be organized and numbered nearly 3,000 men, who are well armed and have an excellent supply of ammunition. A "talking man" from each side has gone to Savai, to compete against one another for securing the following of 300 warriors there. "Whoever side the Savai contingent decide on taking it will make a great difference should the opposing forces come to close quarters.

Another Side of the Story—Correspondence of a Sydney Paper.

The special correspondent of the Sydney Telegraph, writing from Apia, October 15, gives Samoan news of a kind that has not previously come this way. The writer says that the presence of two English war vessels in the harbor had led the insurgents to believe that England would espouse the side of their King, and "there is no doubt the presence of the warships has been used by some of the disaffected white residents of Upolu to incite the supporters of Mataafa to further rebellion."

The white residents of the beach, Rear-Admiral Fairfax left instructions with Captain Pelley of the Lizard, that should any firing take place from any boats within a certain radius of the beach, Captain Pelley was to fire over the boats. If no notice was taken of this caution, he was to immediately fire at and sink them. To prevent any shooting from the seaward by the Tamasese party, Brandeis has removed the whole of Tamasese's forces, lately at Maluluu, to a place called Salafua, a portion of the Atua district, some fifteen miles to the westward of Apia. This move practically removes all immediate danger to the residents of the town.

While the followers of Tamasese were singly denounced at Maluluu Point, the traffickers in firearms were loud in their anathemas against the adviser to Tamasese for not letting his men out of Maluluu to meet their opponents away from any German property. There is no doubt opportunity is everywhere, but when a section of traders wish to see this splendid race of natives fighting one another, simply to enable more ammunition to be blown away, it is time that pressure should be brought to bear at Washington to prevent the American residents of Samoa from supplying the natives with firearms.

Hilo has a curiosity in the person of a blind young Hawaiian who blows an immense red whistle that sounds like the whistle of the steamer Kinan. When he fields out when the steamer will arrive at Hilo, he goes from door to door and reports the hour of arrival.

Supreme Court—At Chambers.

MONDAY, Nov. 12. Probate Division. Before Mr. Justice Preston. Estate Alexander McDuff, W. O. Smith for petitioners. Ordered that the accounts of Henry Waterhouse and John T.
