Three Opium Convictions-Unlicensed Liquor Selling-Committal for Robbery. Frank May and John McCordie were charged with affray. May pleaded guilty; McCordie, not guilty. May testified that McCordie was the aggressor, but independent witnesses swore otherwise. May was fined \$11; McCordie, \$6 20.

Row on Shipboard-Discharge of Defendant on Assault Case. Kennedy, a sailor on the bark S. C. Allen, was on Friday fined \$6 for striking Prescott the mate, when the latter had ordered him to scrape the mast. Joe Hernandez was tried for assaulting M. J. Rocha. J. A. Magoon assisted prosecution and a good deal of evidence was taken. It proved that complainant was the one chiefly at fault and got no more than he deserved. Defendant was discharged.

POLICE COURT.

CIVIL CASES. R. Ballentine vs. G. S. Houghtaling. Assumpsit for \$15, balance of stakes deposited with defendant as a wager on horse race. D. Dayton for plaintiff; W. H. Sea for defendant. Defendant moved that suit be dismissed, because based on an illegal contract; also that suit be transferred to another Judge, because present Judge is disqualified by having expressed opinion in former case. This is the case nominated when heard as "assumpsit for \$15, balance cash deposit," on the 15th inst. On the present occasion defendant offered no evidence, and judgment was given for plaintiff in amount claimed and \$4.95 costs. Appeal noted.

SUPREME COURT.

Third Week of the April Term-Getting a Mixed Jury. The cause appointed for trial before Mr. Justice Dole at term on Monday was B. H. Kahanani vs. Volney V. Ashford, damages for criminal conversation. Court opened at 9 o'clock. A. Rosa appeared for plaintiff; C. Creighton, J. L. Kaulukou and G. K. Wilder for defendant. Mr. Rosa moved that Mr. Creighton be not allowed to appear as attorney in this case, as he is one of the Deputy Marshals. The Court overruled the motion, and the mover noted exceptions.

SUPREME COURT.

The following jury was obtained and sworn to 10:45 o'clock: Chas. Keawe, S. M. Kamakau, John K. Naone, M. Kealii, S. W. Kalkinahe, S. Hookano, E. F. Bishop, Aug. Ehlers, Geo. Koch, J. Grace, J. A. Gilman and J. W. Winter. The prosecution called Father Clement, Naneo (w.), A. W. Carter, Jas. H. Boyd, Keli Nohopono, and Mrs. Wood. During the examination of witnesses, exceptions were taken on both sides to admittance of different points of evidence. The Court adjourned at 4:50 till 9:30 o'clock next morning.

SUPREME COURT.

Mr. Justice McCully on the 15th inst. heard the petition of Lilia K. Aholo, administratrix of the estate of the late Luther Aholo, for allowance of accounts, discharge and final order of distribution. Ordered that accounts be approved, but that discharge be postponed until further need of her authority in division of estate.

SUPREME COURT.

Second Day of a Trial-A Guardianship Matter. The crim. con. case, before a mixed jury, was on all day at term on Tuesday, and the prosecution gave no sign of resting at 4:30 o'clock, when the Court adjourned until 9:30 next morning.

Mr. Justice Preston, on application of Mr. W. O. Smith, attorney, ordered that Hon. A. S. Wilcox, of Hanalei, Kauai, be appointed guardian of the person of Kauli (w.), a minor. The appointment was sought solely to have the child educated under the guardian's custody and at his expense, the parents giving full consent.

SUPREME COURT.

Three Days of One Trial-The End Not Yet. The jury term was occupied on Wednesday till 4:30 with the case begun on Monday, the plaintiff Kahanani being left on the stand for continuation of cross-examination.

SUPREME COURT.

Mr. Justice McCully heard petition of Mrs. Eliza Jane Wilkinson, administratrix of the estate of Geo. Morris, late of Honolulu, deceased, with the will and codicil annexed, for allowance of accounts and discharge. It was ordered that the accounts be approved, the administratrix discharged, and that she retain the property in her hands as the person thereto entitled. J. M. Monsarrat, her attorney, and the petitioner in person, appeared.

SUPREME COURT.

Chief Justice Judd examined and approved third annual account of Trustees of Bishop Estate, the proceedings being reported at length elsewhere. Mr. Justice McCully examined and allowed first account, being for year ending April 18, 1889, of Hon. W. C. Parke, guardian of Frederick Kitchoff, a minor. The account shows receipts of \$1,708.38 and expenditures of \$1,787.47, leaving balance of \$18.09 to credit of guardian.

SUPREME COURT.

Mr. Justice McCully also heard petition of Hon. S. M. Damon, executor, under the will of the estate of the late Sarah Dickson, for discharge. A. S. Hartwell and petitioner in person appeared, and Cecil Brown for M. Dickson. It was ordered that accounts be approved and the executor discharged upon filing final receipts. Accounts show \$2,010.64 received and paid out for debts and legacies of testator. S. M. Damon, by a codicil to the will, was devised \$1,000, and five grand-children, by the will, \$500 each, but the realizations of the estate only left sufficient funds to give S. M. Damon \$748.54, and to S. C. Dickson, H. J. Dickson, L. F. Dickson, H. A. Dickson and J. Bates Dickson \$149.71 each. Stocks and bonds were originally inventoried as belonging to the estate, amounting to \$29,617.78, and being in the hands of Joshua H. Bates, Cincinnati, U. S. A. by note of February 28th appended to the inventory by Mr. Hartwell, however, intimates that, by the will of Mrs. Catherine Bates, the testator Mrs. Dickson had only the income for her life from those securities and they form no part of the estate. Menzies Dickson, son of the testator, was devised certain shares of the Cincinnati Mutual Marine and Fire Insurance Company, his receipt for which will release the executor from all the obligations of that office as ordered by the Court.
