

HER MAJESTY'S BALL.

A Brilliant Affair—List of Those Present.

A large number of invitations were issued to the ball given by their Majesties on Wednesday evening at the Palace, in honor of the Austrian Prince and Princess and suite, who arrived on the S. S. City of Peking from China, and leave to-day on the Australia for the United States and Europe. For the occasion, the Palace was most gorgeously decorated and illuminated, within and without. Around the building from tower to tower, was hung with Chinese lanterns, so thickly that it appeared at a distance to be literally covered with them. Two rows of lanterns were stretched with most tasty effect from the lamp posts in front to the pinnacle of the tower. Rows of lanterns also extended from the Palace to each gate entrance, while along the wall surrounding the enclosure, were set torches in large numbers. Never before has this beautiful edifice been so brilliantly or tastefully decorated. It looked like an enchanted abode of the fairies, and was the admiration of crowds of people who spent the evening gazing at the scene from a distance. The removal of the ugly stone wall added largely to the beauty of the display.

Shortly after 9 o'clock their Majesties appeared in the reception room, and soon after the special guests arrived in whose honor the ball was given, and were presented to the King and Queen by Col. George W. Macfarlane, Chamberlain. After these, other guests were presented as they arrived.

The crowd was very great at one time, about 10 o'clock, when all the rooms and verandas were literally a moving mass of beauty, the uniforms of the naval officers mingling with the rich dresses of the ladies. Before the water was given, and were presented to the King and Queen by Col. George W. Macfarlane, Chamberlain. After these, other guests were presented as they arrived.

There has never been a more brilliant display and assemblage at the Palace than on this occasion, the chief attraction being the royal scions of the Imperial house of Austria, in whose honor the ball was given, in the name of the Queen. Those who met these guests speak in high praises of their charming attractions and good qualities, and they will most certainly long remember their visit to the favored isles of Hawaii.

The editor of that periodical desires to say that neither the Kona sugar company nor the Makaweli company were forgotten, but were omitted because neither of them had yet ground any sugar, nor is either yet prepared to grind. A year hence, probably, both companies can rightfully be included in the list then published.

HILO NEWS LETTER.

An Interesting Political Platform Sketched—Electric Light at Waialea, Etc.

There have been two meetings at Hilo to arrange about the appointment of delegates from the various districts in this island of Hawaii. At the first meeting a committee was appointed to draw up a platform and report at next meeting, which was done on Saturday evening 19th inst. The meeting was well attended and a platform was read and each section was acted on. The platform is as follows:

- 1. Expresses confidence in Ministry.
2. Recommends liberal appropriations for certain objects.
3. That the pay of public officials should be commensurate with their duties.
4. Recommends constitutional action as regards Chinese immigration, and recommends their coming here on certain conditions.
5. That Crown Lands be made Government property.
6. That the affairs of Leper Settlements be investigated and lepers be more liberally dealt with.
7. That liberal appropriation be made for the cause of education.
8. That nothing be done by the Cabinet to jeopardize the independence of these islands.

The platform was generally endorsed. Quite an animated discussion arose as to Chinese restriction, and there was a very close vote. Those in favor of no restriction having one more vote than those opposed. The various delegates are to assemble at Hilo on November 10th to arrange about the nomination of nobles and representatives.

Those smarties who lately sent down a man from Honolulu to have the big Lurline overhauled from stem to stern, with the expectation of seeing a big lot of opium come forth, possibly may have felt much chagrined to have the Government spend so much money for nothing. They were naughty men to have so good a man come here and get into such a profuse perspiration for nothing. It reminds one of the mountain in labor bringing forth not even a mouse this time. He did his level best, no doubt, and had there been any opium on board the Lurline, very likely he would have found it and got the fine suit of clothing offered by the captain. Certainly he deserves great praise for his efforts.

Waialea mill will have an electric light to light the boiling house. It cost several hundred dollars. Every boiling house where work is done at night should have the same kind of light.

Pepeekeo is being put in fine shape and soon will be a model plantation.

The two Japanese war steamers Kono-gi and Hi-yei arrived at Hilo on the 10th inst. and departed on the 20th inst. for Samoa and Fiji, were visited by many of their countrymen and others, are an honor to their country such well equipped vessels and so well conducted. A good number of the Hilo Boarding School boys went on board the Japanese steamer Hi-yei on Sunday the 20th inst. accompanied by the superintendent Rev. A. W. Burt, Judge F. S. Lyman and Rev. Jiro Okabe, Japanese missionary. The captain of the Hi-yei expressed his pleasure at the treatment of the Japanese on the plantations, said he had not heard a word of complaint. The Hilo Boarding School boys sang some of their best selections for the officers assembled, closing with Hawaii Pono. The captain says he shall visit us again. Shall be pleased most certainly to have him do so.

Hilo has its proportion of drunks as well as Honolulu. Two drunk white men were arrested here yesterday.

There were five steamers in Hilo Bay at one time last week, which we do not often see, viz.: two Japanese, three Hawaiians.

Some of the Japanese shipped men have got in the way of taking a run for parts unknown to plantation managers, and have to be hunted up by the police.

The foreigners (young people) have semi-weekly dancing at the rink and have a splendid time.

Mr. H. Luce has resigned as Deputy Sheriff at Hilo and has gone back to his former work, as a luna at Pepeekeo.

The volcano road is now completed thirteen miles and brakes can go fifteen miles. There are no Rip Van Winkles building that road. J. A. M. Hilo, October 21st.

[FROM A NEW CORRESPONDENT.]

The Volcano road is now completed to within one and a half miles of the Half Way House, or nearly twelve miles from Hilo.

The canal that is to connect the Waioalama and Waialea rivers is being cut through cane fields, and at present there is a stop in the works until the cane crop is taken off the ground when the canal will be put through at once.

Hilo has at present taken to dancing. There are two well-patronized schools exclusively devoted to the teaching of dancing—one for whites and the other for natives. Hilo is the only place on the islands where natives take to foreign dancing.

On Friday evening last a birthday anniversary party was given to Mrs. Wilhelm at the Hilo Hall. It was a grand affair in its way. Lunch was served at 10 p. m. and dancing was kept up until the little hours of Saturday morning.

Mr. Luce, formerly deputy sheriff of Hilo, has gone to Pepeekeo as a luna. Mr. Wilson, formerly road superintendent, has gone to Waialea plantation as book-keeper.

The Japanese war-vessels arrived at Hilo on Wednesday last the 17th inst. at dusk, and left at 5 p. m. to-day, Sunday the 20th inst. At one time during their stay there were six deep-water vessels in Byron Bay—three Hawaiian steamers, two war-vessels and one sail vessel.

The business men of Hilo were put about considerably on the occasion of the last mail from this port to Honolulu. By some mistake or neglect on the part of the postmaster, the letters were not put on board the steamer, and you may imagine what a delay of another ten days means. The mistake seems like many others, to be an unaccountable mystery.

The weather last week was rough on the Hamakua coast, and there was plenty of rain all over this part of Hawaii.


