"Mr. BLAINE," says the Washington correspondent of the Chicago News, June 23d, "has created a tremendous sensation by the boldness with which he attacked the policy of the party of which he has been the leader so long, and if he were on the floor of the Senate or House, where he could have the opportunity of debate and parliamentary privileges, there would be no doubt as to the result. If the present policy is pursued it will be against the advice of the President, the Secretary of State and the leading Republican newspapers."

TESTING COAL OIL.

A short time ago, there was some talk about the tests made in this city of different brands of coal oil, some of which tested very low. In an Oakland paper we find the following statement published of an official test made in that city by Chas. J. Woodbury, at the request of the City Council, in the presence of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, the Fire Warden, City Attorney, and members of the City Council: Elaine oil, burned at 138 deg.; Star kerosene, burned at 120 deg.; Parlight, burned at 106 deg.; Pearl oil, burned at 104 deg.; Standard Oil Co.'s bulk oil, burned at 110 deg.; Golden Star, burned at 110 deg.

CONCLUSIONS.

The election has been held and the candidate of the fusion or National Reform party has been returned by a large majority. The returns so far as seen show a slightly heavier vote for the fusion party. In February their heaviest vote was 965; it is now 971. On the other hand the Reform party then polled 821 votes to 535 now; which shows a large amount of indifference on the part of the Reformers, for the total number of voters has increased; yet the vote polled was only 1,506 as against over 1,720 in February. It shows that the fusionists are well organized and under the control of thorough politicians, while the organization of the Reformers was loose and languid. The successful party polled its full strength. It also shows that the Reformers did not feel the occasion to be of great importance. There is a very general feeling that the majority of the National Reformers in the Legislature are safe men, and this feeling is probably correct. They are not men who will readily consent to rash or retrogressive legislation, unless in matters of apparently small importance they yield points to pacify their allies. It is in just those points that the danger lies, and it was on just such matters that an opposition to Mr. Berger was founded. The result shows also that the position on Oahu is very similar to that of large communities in the United States. The battle is fought not so much on principle as on prejudice. The Elele, we regret to have to believe, voiced the sentiments of a considerable number of our mechanics. It conducted the campaign against Mr. Young on personal grounds. He was a capitalist and therefore the enemy of workingmen. That was the main force and gist of the cry. Joined with that was the preposterous and silly cry of "missionary!" But the latter is only a part of the former and includes every person who is in favor of honest, conservative government conducted for the equal good of all without spoils. Of course the bitter outcry conducted by the Elele and Mr. Bush's paper against the whole produced its effect and undoubtedly carried nearly all of the Hawaiian vote. The mechanic however held the balance of power and used it against himself as he will find in the future. The Reform party is not dead. It lives and will continue to live and fulfill its mission of contending for and winning true popular government for Hawaii, which will long maintain our independence and autonomy.

Everybody knows how the death of Father Damien caused an immediate access of interest regarding the terrible disease from which he died. The movement resulted in New South Wales in the drafting of a Leper Bill, and the prosecution of active inquiries by the Health Board as to the prevalence of the disease in the Australian colonies. From the Board's report it appears that the total number of lepers under official cognizance at the close of 1889 was thirty, of whom twelve were in New South Wales, four in Victoria, two in South Australia, six in Queensland, one in West Australia and five in Fiji. The number in New Zealand was not stated.

ANOTHER FATAL ACCIDENT.

Mrs. Henry Castle Thrown from Her Carriage at Waikiki, and Receives Severe Injuries.

Another has been added to the terrible list of fatal accidents of recent occurrence. On Monday afternoon about half-past 1 o'clock Mrs. Henry N. Castle, wife of the editor of this paper, was about to start for town from Waikiki. She had stepped into the carriage, when the horse took a sudden fright and ran away around the yard throwing her violently to the ground, from which she received injuries so severe that her death resulted in about an hour. Mr. Castle who was at the Legislature was telephoned for and arrived in time to see his wife alive but quite unconscious.

The deceased lady who had endeared herself to a large circle of friends leaves her husband, a baby girl only a few weeks old, and in Germany, her home, a mother, three sisters and a brother to mourn her loss. It is less than a year since she was led to the altar a bride, and she returned here with her husband the latter part of last year. She was in fine health, and life was full of hope and joy. The future was alluring and delightful and held out a smiling promise. The news was a great shock to the entire community and sympathy was freely expressed for the stricken young husband and friends.

The Last Rites.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Henry N. Castle took place at the family mansion in King street, at 4 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon. The large parlors and adjoining rooms were crowded with ladies, as were also the verandas with gentlemen, among whom were quite a number of German residents. The coffin was covered with most beautiful and rich bouquets of the choicest flowers, including magnolias and white lilies.

Rev. Dr. Beckwith officiated in the services, which included singing by a choir. At the close of the exercises, the coffin was borne to the hearse and conveyed to the Kawaiahao cemetery near by, followed by the mourners and a procession on foot of nearly all who were present at the dwelling.

At the grave prayer was offered by Dr. Beckwith, and the coffin was lowered into its last resting-place, literally hidden with flowers and ferns. It was one of the most touching scenes witnessed here for many a year—a young and charming daughter of German fatherland, snatched so suddenly from her home and child, so soon after her arrival here—the aged father and mother bending in sorrow with their bearded son over the open grave, and surrounded with friends who had come to pay their last tributes of love and affection—it was a scene that touched every heart and drew tears from every eye.

It may not be amiss to state that the deceased was a descendant of the family of the celebrated Rubens, and had she lived would undoubtedly have been an ornament to Honolulu society.




