

THE LEADERS OF THE NATIONAL REFORM PARTY.

The following choice extracts from speeches made by the leaders of the National Reform Party in the Legislative Hall and at their mass meetings, will show the efforts that have been made by them to stir up insurrection and strife:

When discussing the Military Bill in the Legislature, "Rep. R. W. Wilcox saw no use in any reference to the Military Committee. It is idle talk to say that the love of the people will protect the King. If anyone said that to me outside of the House, I would knock his head off, but I have regard to the decorum of the House. People say there will be no trouble, but I say that if the people are not granted their rights the streets will be sticky with blood. We will have another 30th of June. Buildings will be blown up, many people killed, and I myself will take a hand if the people are not granted their rights."

On the same occasion "Rep. Bush favored reference to a committee. The state of the country made it necessary to be prepared to suppress any uprising. It is ridiculous to say that it is unnecessary to have forces. As long as Waterhouse, E. O. Hall & Son, Castle & Cooke and others imported guns we must be armed. E. O. Hall & Son had imported \$28,000 cartridges. What was a missionary firm doing with cartridges? (Noble Marsden—What kind of cartridges?) To shoot men with. (Shot gun or bullet?) Bullets. (Are you sure?) Yes. (Laughter) Who are in possession of these guns? Not the natives, but the foreigners."

At the so called "mass meeting" on the evening of the 9th of September, where two or three hundred men, women and children were assembled, "John E. Bush said they proposed to have a new constitution, one that every man, woman and child (?) in the Kingdom had a voice in. He would like to see the judge who could base his opinion on the present illegal constitution. (A voice—You were elected under it.) It was framed by a handful of men, a lot of robbers, who have robbed you of your rights. They ought to be hung, everyone of them."

At the same meeting "Robt. W. Wilcox spoke in Hawaiian. He said he was the first to refuse to have anything to do with the present constitution. (A voice—You were also elected under it.) If any National Reformer votes against this conventional bill he should be torn to pieces, from limb to limb. They would be considered rebels, be they noble or representative. \* \* If the nobles and representatives elected on this island don't vote for this enabling act, they ought to be spat on by every native. A vote of want of confidence is ready, but if the Ministers vote for this they will be saved. One day the Ministers are National Reformers, another day they are National Reformers, another day they are National Reformers. They are like Judas, and not fit to clean horse shoes. He formed his opinion of the Ministers the first day they sat in the House. Unless the enabling act was passed, they would hang on with this Legislature to the next one. We Hawaiians must stand together, and if there is trouble we will make trouble and follow it to the bitter end."

BADLY BURNED.

An Explosion of Gas at the Ice Works Severely Injures One of the Employees.

Wednesday morning an explosion of gas took place at the works of the People's Ice and Refrigerating Company out on Beretania street, resulting in Charles Leroy, one of the employees, being very badly burned on the chest, right arm and hand, and also somewhat on the face. He was taken to the Queen's Hospital and his injuries at once attended to.

It appears that on Tuesday the pumps had been cleaned. Wednesday morning Leroy went into the pit under the pumps, and foolishly took a light with him. Gas had evidently settled at the bottom of the pit, for without any warning an explosion occurred, and Leroy, as he states, was blown right out of the hole, and burned about the body, as above stated.

Successful Entertainment.

The entertainment of tableaux and music under the auspices of the Y. W. C. T. U. at the Y. M. C. A. hall Thursday evening, was most successful. The audience filled the hall and the entertainment gave entire satisfaction. The programme consisted of instrumental and vocal duets, vocal and violin solos, by a number of our leading amateurs. The several tableaux were really grand, great pains having evidently been taken in their preparation. The audience applauded them all. Appropriate music was played on the piano during the tableaux by Miss Parmelee and Mr. Oscar Herold. The funds of the Y. W. C. T. U. will be largely increased by the entertainment.

On the 16th the maximum thermometer of the weather service reached 89 deg., the highest recorded for the year. On the 17th the maximum was not as high, but the average for the twenty-four hours was the highest of any in the year, viz., 79 deg. 5 min. This may be interesting to advertisers of our climate. The range of the thermometer on the 16th was 21 deg.

SUDDEN DEATH.

Mr. Charles N. Arnold Dies While Calling on a Friend.

Wednesday evening Mr. and Mrs. Chas. N. Arnold according to their usual custom spent the evening at the residence of Mr. Malcolm Brown, Nuuanu Avenue. About 9:30 o'clock Mr. Arnold complained of pain near his heart, and medical aid was summoned. Nothing could be done for him, however, and he breathed his last half an hour later. The cause of death was aneurism of the heart.

Charles N. Arnold was born in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, and at the time of his death was forty-four years and eight days of age. He has been a resident of the Islands quite a number of years, and leaves a widow and six children to mourn his loss. At one time he kept the Arnold House, Hilo, and later the Park Beach Hotel, Waikiki. Latterly he has been employed in the Public Works department. Deceased was a member of George W. De Long Post No. 45, G. A. R.

The funeral of the late Charles N. Arnold took place Thursday afternoon from St. Andrew's Cathedral, and was largely attended. The Rev. Alex. Mackintosh read the service. Members of the G. A. R. were present.

Breakfast at the U. S. Legation.

M.'s Commissioner, Mons. B. d'Anglade, French Commissioner, Mr. T. Masaki, Japanese Consul, Capt. Remy, U. S. N., Capt. J. Bishop, U. S. N., Capt. G. N. Pollard, R. N., Mr. H. W. Severance, U. S. Consul-General, and Lieut. Dyer, U. S. N. The table looked beautiful and the menu was an excellent one. The band of the U. S. Flagship Charleston was stationed on the lawn and played during the breakfast.

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
