Cool weather still continues, the full-blooded breeder of malaria, colds, etc. Messrs. E. Hoffschlaeger & Co. offer ex recent arrivals superior wines, cigars, etc. Capt. Houdette of the Australia reports the trip down one of the roughest he ever experienced. A special term of the Supreme Court will be held Monday, March 30th for the hearing of banco cases only. Mr. W. A. Peairs who visited the volcano last week reports witnessing a grand display. He was much pleased with his trip. Mr. H. T. Walker, engineer of the Pepeekeo Sugar Plantation, is in town, having been granted a three months' leave of absence. The bark Martha Davis is announced to sail from Boston for this port on or about June 15th. Messrs. C. Brewer & Co. are the agents. Tuesday, the 17th inst., will be observed as a public holiday, it being the birthday anniversary of Kamehameha III. It is also St. Patrick's day. The San Francisco Music and Drama says "the Hawaiian national hymn, as played by the Baldwin orchestra is a beautiful piece of music." The steamer Likelike lost a boat at Paunah last week, the crew barely escaping with their lives. One of the men had his left arm broken. The agents of the Pacific Mail Company state that they have no advice of the China's touch here this month, and the report is probably incorrect. The great coursing event in England—the Waterloo Cup—was won by Colonel North's dog Fullerton, February 21st. Fullerton won the event in 1890. The Secretary of the Board of Education announces that the regular vacation of all public schools, at the close of the first session of the year, will extend from April 10th to the 27th. Rice's Evangeline Troupe will be on the Alameda due the 12th inst. en route to Australia. They have written to Mr. L. J. Levey that they would like to stay over in Honolulu for a short season. Mr. John L. Sullivan, the pugilist and actor, writes to Mr. L. J. Levey that he will pass through Honolulu in June on his way to the Colonies. He is desirous of giving a display of his ability in this city. The new captain of the Household Guard is Mr. Samuel Nowlein, Sergeant at Arms of the Legislature of 1890. Lieut. W. J. Feary has been appointed first lieutenant and Hiram Kaaha, second lieutenant. Judge G. B. Burnett of St. Louis is stopping at the Hawaiian Hotel. Thursday morning he was present in the Supreme Court during the hearing of a case. Judge Burnett is also attorney for the Wabash railway. Their Excellencies the Hons. Samuel Parker, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Chas. N. Spencer, Minister of the Interior, visited the U. S. warships Mohican and Iroquois, on Thursday morning. The customary salute was fired. A masquerade ball was given on Thursday night at the residence of Mr. J. B. Castle, Waikiki, in honor of Miss Nellie White. A large company was present, and all enjoyed the merry occasion. The Hawaiian string band furnished music. A French paper says that an Italian singer has employed a creole soprano, a negro contralto, a German tenor, a Hawaiian baritone, and a French pianist, to travel in his company on a professional tour to the United States. Query: Who's the Hawaiian baritone? Kauai was having its full share of cold weather during the first part of the week. Mrs. Isenberg, of Lihue, reported the thermometer at her house as low as 49 degrees on Wednesday morning. The thermometer at the Hon. W. H. Rice's place registered at 50 degrees the same morning. Mr. Maurice Goldberg, the well-known and gentlemanly proprietor of the gent's furnishing and clothing store, corner of Fort and Merchant street, contemplates a trip to the Coast on business and pleasure, leaving on the Australia next week. Mr. Goldberg has certainly earned a vacation. It is rumored that he may not return alone. Mr. Cogswell, the artist, so well and favorably known to the residents of Honolulu has just completed portraits of Judge and Mrs. Widemann, Hon. W. G. Irwin, Hon. M. P. Robinson, and General Grant. All are remarkably fine likenesses, for which the artist is justly celebrated. The Honolulu and Stars will unite the coming baseball season, so 'tis said. Col. M. Thompson the well-known lawyer, died February 11th at Bastrop, Texas. We have received from the Hawaiian Hardware Company a most beautiful calendar for 1891. Rain is greatly needed at Hana, Maui. The mill stopped operations last week on account of shortage of water. Step into H. F. Wichman's store if you are looking for fine jewelry, watches, silverware, gold pens, novelties, etc. An expert bicycle rider made the journey from near the Post Office to Waikiki in fifteen minutes Thursday evening. The new stone sidewalk in front of Mr. Chas. Hammer's store on King and Fort streets is a decided improvement. Mrs. Kirkbride and Miss Severance who have been visiting friends on the island of Maui the last few weeks, have returned to town. On the 13th instant, a special meeting of the Mutual Telephone Company will be held. The question of consolidation will come up. Under the law passed at the last session of the Legislature, the Hon. J. O. Dominis has been commissioned as Governor of the Island of Oahu. Mr. Frank P. Hastings formerly U. S. Vice and Deputy Consul General has been appointed Secretary of the Foreign Office vice Hon. C. P. Iaukea. The Supreme Court sat in banco March 2d. His Ex. W. A. Whiting, the new Attorney-General, was introduced to the Court by Mr. A. P. Peterson. Messrs. H. F. Bertelmann and T. B. Antone Ross. Mr. Jas. W. Robertson is to be congratulated on his appointment by Her Majesty the Queen to be Chamberlain of the Royal Household. Mr. Robertson will make an excellent chamberlain in every respect. The fire companies' practice at Emma square stood them in good need for the recent fire, even if some of the residents around the square did get a little soaked with muddy water. How would it do to employ the Fire Department to sprinkle the streets? Pedestrians along the sidewalks would be just as safe from getting a wetting as from the sprinklers. President Harrison, family and party will visit California and probably Oregon and Alaska, in the spring, and their visit may be extended to Alaska. The Call says that the new cruiser San Francisco will be the vessel on which President Harrison and his family will make their trip up the coast. The cruiser Charleston will be at the disposal of the rest of the Presidential party. San Francisco papers refer to a new elliptical carbon, recently invented and manufactured by the Fort Wayne Company, which is said to be superior to those in use. It burns from 22 to 24 hours. It is one inch thick, while the others are about a half-inch, but the shadow is about the same as the smaller one. The light is a pure white, and much stronger. The Australia sails for San Francisco at noon to-day with a full passenger list and a large cargo of domestic produce. Messrs. Hollister & Co. have just received direct from Paris an assortment of the celebrated Lubin's perfumes. They lead the world. Who was Niels Wilhelm Gade? Hall to hear a lecture upon "The Countries of the Rio de la Plata," by His Excellency Hon. J. L. Stevens, U. S. Minister Plenipotentiary. Many of our prominent residents were among those present. His Excellency was introduced to his audience by Mr. T. R. Walker, President of the Y. M. C. A. Mr. Stevens read from manuscript, and for over an hour held the close attention of his auditors. He spoke of his leaving New York in 1870 with his family for South America to do service as a United States Minister. After a delightful passage the city of Rio de Janeiro was reached. He gave a most interesting description of that city, mentioning the first settler. From Rio de Janeiro he went to Montevideo, where he was received with great honors on landing. The political history of the country was outlined. The speaker touched on the war between Paraguay and Brazil and Uruguay combined, its cause and how many perished. A BRILLIANT SUCCESS.

II Trovatore as Given by the New York Opera Co. The Hawaiian Opera House Filled with a Fashionable Assemblage.—A Splendid Performance.—Much Enthusiasm.—Numerous Floral Offerings. Verdi's "II Trovatore" was given at the Hawaiian Opera House Saturday evening by the New York Opera Company, the cast being as follows: Leonora.....Miss Camille Mouri Azucena.....Miss Fannie Myers Inez.....Miss L. Dean Retainers, Gypsies, Nuns, Attendants. An exceedingly large and fashionable audience greeted the company on this its first appearance, many people having to stand. Such a large audience has rarely been seen in our opera house. The Royal box was occupied by His Ex. Governor J. O. Dominis, Hon. A. S. Cleghorn and Jas. W. Robertson, Esq., Her Majesty's Chamberlain. Others noticed in different parts of the house were: Their Excellencies Samuel Parker, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and ladies, Hon. H. A. Widemann, Minister of Finance, and Mrs. Widemann, W. A. Whiting, Attorney-General, and Miss Whiting, Senhor Canavarro, Portuguese Charge d'Affaires, Mons. d'Anglade, French Commissioner, Hon. Wm. G. Irwin, Mr. Justice Bickerton, Capt. Shepard, U. S. S. Mohican, Hon. W. H. Cornwell and ladies, Hon. E. C. Macfarlane and ladies, Dr. and Mrs. J. S. McGrew, Mrs. Paul Neumann, Hon. J. A. Cummins and ladies, Paymaster Sullivan, U. S. N., and wife, etc. II Trovatore is known in every part of the world, it is a household name, but is one of those operas always a pleasure to listen to when well represented. On this occasion it was given in excellent style. The company exerted themselves to the utmost, and filled their respective parts to the entire satisfaction of the large audience present, receiving in return repeated applause. Particular mention must be made of the second act, which introduces the band of gypsies. This scene was mounted with much taste. The chorus sang well and the anvil chorus was effective. The chorus of nuns in the second act was a delightful bit of vocalization. The last act, the punishment, which introduces the Miserere, was received with the warmest enthusiasm, and part of it had to be repeated. The audience would not let the performance go on until the demand for a repetition was acceded to. The opera throughout was mounted with a fine display of picturesque costumes and illuminations, aided by the electric light. Miss Camille Mouri as Leonora made a decided success by her superb acting, while singing with great brilliancy. Miss Mouri has not only a soprano voice of great range and power, but she acts with the utmost intensity, and thoroughly identifies herself with the part. In the tower scene in the fourth act her singing was wonderfully effective, arousing the audience to a high pitch of enthusiasm. Miss Fannie Myers, as Azucena the Gypsy, made a great hit, singing and playing the part with a naturalness of the highest order. She uses her voice (contralto) with considerable skill. Her interpretation of the role throughout was exceedingly artistic. Miss L. Carmen took the part of Inez, rendering it with much faithfulness, her singing being all that could be desired. Manrico was excellently presented by Mr. Robert Stantini, who is the fortunate possessor of a most agreeable tenor voice, robust in quality, and of sufficient range, the higher notes being particularly sweet. He has a good stage presence, and throughout did splendid work. Mr. Sylvain Langlois, as Count Di Luna, displayed a baritone voice of rich quality, and there was an earnestness about his acting that was most enjoyable. Mr. Langlois is undoubtedly a clever artist. The part of Ferrando, which was taken by that old favorite, Mr. W. H. Hamilton, is a small one, but his magnificent singing and clear enunciation was as perfect as could be. We shall see him in greater roles later on. It will not be out of the way at this time to congratulate Mr. Hamilton on his selection of one of the finest opera companies that has ever visited these shores. This was shown by the grand performance Saturday evening. Now that we have this company in our midst, let us show our appreciation by the most liberal patronage. It is to be hoped that whenever the company appears it will only be before a full house. Mr. Oscar Herold was the musical conductor, and also presided at the piano. He had a difficult task, but was fully equal to it. He is deserving of the highest praise for his conscientious work. Mr. J. Borjes lead with his violin, and there is no doubt of his ability as a violinist. He played throughout in the most musicianly manner. Mr. Henry Berger, our esteemed bandmaster, had his full orchestra out, playing between the acts. The orchestra shows the most careful training on his part, as on this occa-

The native performed his task, and the monster was finally got on board, but not without making a desperate struggle for its liberty. The bullet had only wounded it.
