LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

By the arrival of the barkentine
S. G. Wilder, 16 1/2 days from San
Francisco, news dates to May 7th
have been received, of which the fol-
lowing is a summary:

Gen. James F. B. Marshal Dead.

Boston, May 6.—General J. F. B.
Marshal died at Kendall Green, Mass.,
to-day. He had been manager of the
Hampton Institute for Indians, a mem-
ber of the staff of Massachusetts' War
Governor Andrews, a "Forty-niner" of
California and a big sugar plantation
holder of the Sandwich Islands. He was
born in Boston in 1818, and was 72 years
old.

James Fowle Baldwin Marshal was
widely known from his great interest in
the Indian question and from his asso-
ciation with the work of Massachusetts
in the war. He was born in Boston on
August 8, 1818, and was educated at the
Derby Academy in Hingham. Mr. Mar-
shal was the author of the article in the
March Century, entitled "Three Gold-
Dust Stories." He was one of the forty-
niners in California, leaving the Sand-
wich Islands temporarily to establish a
branch commercial house in the gold
regions.

A dispatch from Lima, May 6th, as-
serts that 180 of the crew of the Blanco
Encalada were drowned when she sank.

Ex-Senator Miller arrived at Tampa,
May 6th, from Graytown, and left for
New York that evening. He is much
pleased with the progress of work on the
Nicaragua canal.

At Mission-street wharf the steam
schooner Farralona, Captain Bonifield,
will commence to load to-day for the
sea islands. She will take a cargo of
salt, coal and provisions.

PANAMA, May 6th.—Reports just re-
ceived state that a revolutionary move-
ment is in progress in Costa Rica, and
that the President has declared a state
of siege, and suspended personal guar-
antees on the 1st of May.

The result of the election held May 5th
for a successor in Parliament to the late
Edward Greene, who represented the
northwest division of Suffolk, shows the
Gladstonians have won another victory.
Baron Stern (Gladstonian) was elected.

A special from Folsom says: Millions
of grasshoppers have appeared on the
ranches around there. Much uneasiness
is felt and great destruction has
already been done. The hay crop will
be the only thing that will not suffer, as
it is nearly harvested.

The discovery was made near Monte-
zuma by Dr. Stratton of an Indian boy
in a Chinese camp in an advanced state
of leprosy. It is stated that there are
two Indians in Sonora afflicted with the
same disease. The Supervisors are in-
vestigating the matter.

Advices from Chile state that four
Congressional delegates had an inter-
view with President Balmaceda and
asked him to resign, dismiss his army,
appear in court and justify his conduct,
and allow Congress to prepare for a new
Presidential election. There is small
hope of a settlement.

The reciprocity agreement proposed by
the U. S. State Department under the
provisions of the McKinley bill, was on
April 23d formally approved by the
Venezuelan Federal Council as well as
by the government without the slightest
change. It thus only wants the Presi-
dent's signature to become a law.

CHICAGO, May 6.—The challenge bil-
liards between Jacob Schaefer, the
world's champion, and Eugene Carter at
Central Music Hall to-night was easily
won by Schaefer. The game started
Schaefer 800, Carter 481. Through-
out the match, Carter had the best run—111,
Schaefer's highest being 104. About 2,500
people witnessed the contest.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 6th.—The anti-
semitic have suddenly suspended the ex-
pulsion of Jews from Moscow. It is re-
ported that there were disorders at War-
saw on Sunday, but they were sup-
pressed by the troops. The agitation
among the Russian Poles is spreading.
Official circles here put the blame upon
the conciliatory policy adopted by the
Government in Prussian Poland, and
believe Germany's object is to arouse
envy and discontent among the Russian
Poles.

The New Orleans Grand Jury, which
has had under consideration the homi-
cide in the jail in New Orleans, has filed
its report and has not found any indict-
ment against any one concerned. This
is what was to be expected, for how
could a Grand Jury indict a whole city?
The attack upon the jail and the killing
of the Italians within its walls was un-
doubtedly by the common consent of the
inhabitants of the city did not participate
in it, and a Grand Jury might as well
try to indict a revolution as a popular
uprising in a great city.

LONDON, May 6.—An increase of the
Bank of England rate is likely in view of
the probable withdrawal of gold. Russia
is angry over the Rothschilds' action in
calling in the balances in the European
capitals. The bonuses are much dis-
turbed, remembering the results of such
recalls in the cases of the Comptoir
d'Escompte and during the Barings' crisis.
Leading bankers are less apprehensive,
knowing that such vindictive
action will endanger any future Russian
