

OWNERSHIP OF PRESCRIPTIONS.

A question of law has just been settled in England. That is the legal ownership of a physician's prescription. In the English case the doctor claimed that he was himself the owner of his prescription, and that he could require his patient to return it to him after it had been filled. He held that the combination of drugs which he prescribed was his property, his invention, and that the written prescription was a mere memorandum to be temporarily used by the patient in order to prevent any mistakes caused by a defective memory. The Court ruled that his position was not sound, and that the prescription, being the outward and visible sign of the treatment for which the patient paid, was his property.

In this country we have never heard of a case where a doctor wanted a prescription back. But it constantly happens that a druggist who fills a prescription, pastes the paper in a book and refuses to return it to his customer. That is going too far. The druggist acquires no property in the prescription by mixing the drugs it prescribes. His rights are at an end when he has been paid for his drugs. The prescription remains the property of the party who tenders it to the druggist, and can no more be retained by the latter than any other property belonging to the customer. Where the druggist, under the State law, which requires him to keep a record of his business, chooses to file away the prescription he fills he should at all events supply his customer with an authentic copy verified by his own signature.

It often happens that a sick person coming from a neighboring State is relieved by a prescription obtained from a city doctor. The invalid naturally desires to take that prescription away for further use in case of a return of the malady. He should be enabled to do so, either by retaining the prescription itself or by being furnished with an exact copy of it by the druggist.—Ex.

THOUGHTFUL EMPLOYERS.

It is an employer's duty to be as thoughtful of his clerk, as it is the duty of the latter to be thoughtful of his employer's interest. A good clerk will appreciate the effort of a good employer to treat him properly and recognize that a clerk is a human being. There is occasionally an employer who seems to forget this. He is unreasonable in his demands, harsh and exacting. He demands very long hours on very small pay. He forgets that it is not an employer's privilege to demand everything of a clerk, simply because the latter is in his employ.

It is a good plan to occasionally say a good word for your clerk and to him. Let him know you appreciate his work if it is satisfactory. If it is the clerk's duty to stay in the store evenings, surprise him occasionally by saying, "Well, Charles, I'll stay to-night, and you can take a little rest, if you wish; you don't get out much." The clerk will repay you, never fear. If he has been tempted to shirk or take advantage of you, the probability is that he will exert himself to please you. It pays to be considerate of your employee.

A retailer should advise his clerks. If possible, instruct them in business methods, and when opportunity offers where they can benefit themselves, give them a pleasant good by and what assistance you can, no matter how much you may regret their departure.

A merchant in consistency must be as watchful of his clerk's interests as his clerk is of his employer's.—Minneapolis Commercial Bulletin.

A Married Woman's Will.

If a woman makes a will before marriage the fact of her marriage makes the will worthless. This is the common-law rule, and still prevails in the large majority of the States. In Vermont and perhaps some other marriages does not necessarily invalidate a woman's will, but unless one is certain of the point in her own State she should attend to the matter by making a new will immediately after marriage, and, if possible, secure her husband's consent to it written and signed on the document itself. This consent is not everywhere necessary, but is always wise. In Massachusetts it is absolutely necessary if by its terms the will cuts off any claim which our laws give to a widower on the estate of his wife. A man's will, at common law and in the majority of States now, is not invalidated by his subsequent marriage alone, but if a child is born the concurrence of the two events makes her will also worthless, and he must write another.—Chautauquan.

BEHRING SEA CONVENTION AND PROCLAMATION.

President Harrison has issued a Proclamation in regard to a closed season for seal fishing. He cites, first, the fact of an agreement having been arrived at with the British Government on the following points, which has been signed by the representatives of the two Governments:

(1) Her Majesty's Government will prohibit, until May next, seal killing in that part of Behring Sea lying eastward of the line of demarcation described in Article No. 1 of the treaty of 1867 between the United States and Russia, and will promptly use its best efforts to insure the observance of this prohibition by British subjects and vessels.

(2) The United States Government will prohibit seal killing for the same period in the same part of Behring Sea and on the shores and islands thereof the property of the United States (in excess of 7,500 to be taken on the islands for the subsistence and care of the natives), and will promptly use its best efforts to insure the observance of this prohibition by United States citizens and vessels.

(3) Every vessel or person offending against this prohibition in the said waters of Behring Sea outside of the ordinary territorial limits of the United States, may be seized and detained by the naval or other duly commissioned officers of either of the high contracting parties; but they shall be handed over as soon as practicable to the authorities of the nation to which they respectively belong, who shall alone have jurisdiction to try the offense and impose the penalties for the same. The witnesses and proof necessary to establish the offense shall also be sent with them.

(4) In order to facilitate such proper inquiries Her Majesty's Government may desire to make, with a view to the presentation of the case of that Government before arbitrators, and in expectation that an agreement for arbitration may be arrived at, it is agreed that suitable persons designated by Great Britain will be permitted, at any time, upon the seal islands during the present sealing season for that purpose.

Then follows the proclamation.

"Now, therefore, be it known that I, Benjamin Harrison, President of the United States of America, have caused the said agreement to be made public to the end that the same and every part thereof may be observed and fulfilled with good faith by the United States of America and the citizens thereof.

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed."
