

VATICAN AND QUIRINAL.

Conflict Between the Pope and the House of Savoy.

The conflict between the Vatican and the Quirinal, which has never altogether ceased, has just now become more acute than ever. Premier Crispi is determined to uphold the integrity of Italy, the Curia hopes to regain, through the Queen, the much coveted worldly power, which it lost in 1870. The friends of the church, both in Italy and Germany, advise the Pope to accept the loss of his worldly power as an irremediable fact. The French press encourages the Pope to hold out.

The Journal des Debats, Paris, says: "During the last two months a remarkable change has taken place in the attitude of Crispi toward the Vatican. He is less pliable. The Premier refuses to ratify the appointment of several bishops, which he did not seem to oppose in January. It seems very much as if Crispi intends to frighten the Curia, to coerce it into submission. The assistance of the Catholics is needed at the ballot-box, but they will not vote unless the Pope gives the word. The Pope may not be unwilling to come to terms, but he is restrained by his regard for France."

The Observateur Francais, Paris, is authority for the following: "For the last two or three months Queen Margherite has been in constant unrest. She is convinced that the reign of the House of Savoy will shortly be ended by a revolution, and that her life is in danger. 'I will end like Marie Antoinette,' she cries. 'We will not escape punishment for having taken Rome! Our fate approaches through the Porta Pia. If the matter was left to her she would give Rome back to the Holy See unconditionally.'"

The Augsburg Post-Zeitung, Augsburg, Germany, remarks upon this: "All this is nothing new. The late Empress Augusta informed a Protestant member of the Prussian Court, in 1887, that the Queen of Italy asked her to assist in satisfying the Pope. King Humbert also looks upon the cessation of the struggle with the church as necessary for the existence of the monarchy."

The Deutsche Volksblatt, Stuttgart, declares that Crispi is very angry at all this, and threatens to prevail upon the King to have Queen Margherite confined to the palace, a measure which it will be difficult to execute, as the queen is very popular.

The Reichsbote, Berlin, believes that the difficulty is due to French machinations. "We have repeatedly pointed out," says the paper, "that the French Ambassador to the Vatican, Lefebvre de Bataine, exercises a kind of terrorism there. When the press of Italy accused the Pope of indifference to the sufferings of the people, the Pope denied the imputation, but did nothing to convince the people to the contrary. He is, practically, a prisoner to France. When the Pope tried to mediate between the Sicilians and the Government, his advice was half-hearted. He dares not assist in strengthening the Government for fear of France."

Similar opinions are expressed by Raffaele de Cesare in the Nuova Antologia, Rome. He says: "The Pope need not flatter himself that he will escape the general ruin if the Italian Government be destroyed. The rentes and pensions which the present Government allows to the church would cease to be paid if royalty fell. Only one course is open to the Pope. He must revoke the non expedit which forbids the Catholics to vote. He has tried everything else. He has gone from court to court, from Government to Government begging for help, and asking to be reinstated as a State ruler. He should now identify his interests with that of the Crown. When the Catholics are seen at the political gatherings and at the Quirinal, their influence will act as a wholesome restraint upon certain radical parties. The Catholics are the conservative element. Their entrance into politics means nothing less than the emancipation of the Vatican from French politics, and the salvation of Italy. Their absence from the polls alone has made the present rule of corruption in parliamentary circles possible. This absence now threatens ruin to the country and the church."

GREEK GEORGE.

His Performance Was Not a Howling Success.

Professor John Theodore Hatzopolus, who claims to be one of the strongest men in the world, gave a performance at the Opera House Saturday evening. The Professor, who also says he is a doctor, may be very strong, but he was not strong enough to draw more than about twenty-five people to see him. The performance lasted about one hour, and when the few people who were there left they were not very well pleased with Mr. Hatzopolus, for his performance had all the appearances of a fake.

The doctor is a tall, loosely-jointed man, who does not look as though he were strong enough to break his word. He wore a suit of black tights, which were evidently made for someone else, who was larger than the famous doctor, for it hung on him like a gunny sack. The doctor did not do any of the marvelous feats which he advertised. He did lift two men, one in each hand; but the stone breaking process was omitted. The doctor says he can put a piece of granite rock on his head and let a man break it with a sledge-hammer; but he didn't. When it came to be time to allow a horse to walk backward and forward over his body, and to play see-saw over his anatomy, the doctor seemed to be ready but the horse objected. No urging nor coaxing could induce the fiery steed to walk up the board which the doctor had laid across his chest. So, in default of this four men sat on him for a few minutes, and then he arose and waved his hands with an air of triumph at the audience. After this wonderful feat he dismissed the people and the show was over.

Wrecked Ship Gosford.

The tug Fearless arrived recently from San Diego with John D. Spreckels and family as passengers. On the trip from the south the tug stopped at the wreck of the British ship Gosford at Point Conception. The Gosford was bound here with coal consigned to John D. Spreckels & Brother. She caught fire at sea and a run was made for the coast. Several attempts were made to raise the vessel, but she stuck hard and fast. John D. Spreckels was seen on 'Change, and said that the Gosford is lying on a sandy bottom with her masts and spars intact. She is full of water, her decks being below low tide several feet, and just her ends stick out. To get the water out of her she will have to be bulkheaded. Mr. Spreckels says that he has no doubt that the vessel can be raised. He has received several offers to that effect, and it is possible that in a short time another attempt will be made to save the valuable vessel. "We had the Gosport bulkheaded once before," said Mr. Spreckels, "and we would have raised her that time but for the storm which came up and destroyed all our work."—S. F. Chronicle.


