British Bark Centaur Destroyed April 17th.

CREW ARRIVED SAFE AT HILO.

A Lamp Dropped in the Hold the Cause of Disaster—Vessel Burned to the Waters Edge—Eight Days in an Open Boat—Had a Rough Time.

KAU (Hawaii), April 28.—News was received by telephone from Hilo this morning that the captain, first and second officers and the crew of twenty-one men of the British bark Centaur had arrived in Hilo about 8 o'clock, fatigued by a voyage of nine days in two open boats, having abandoned their ship on account of fire.

The story as told by Captain John S. Bester is substantially as follows:—The Centaur sailed from San Francisco on April 15th, laden with wheat for Maryborough, Queensland. On the 17th inst., while sailing at a good rate, in 14 deg. 48 min. north latitude, and 142 deg. 42 min. west longitude, the vessel caught fire in the hold, caused by one of the crew dropping a lamp, which smashed to pieces on a bale of burlap, supposed to have been saturated with paraffine oil. The flames spread very rapidly from one quarter to another, aided on by the combustible materials aboard. The crew was set to work immediately and brought to bear every effort within their power to extinguish the flames. Our position, 800 miles from the nearest land (Hilo) made the men desperate in their work. At last I saw the uselessness of further struggle and made up my mind to abandon the ship while there was yet time. This I did on the morning of the 18th, but remained alongside with the two boats for twenty-four hours. When the deck was almost on a level with the sea we cast one long look at our lost ship and set out for Hilo, with the boats fully supplied with provisions and water. The ship's papers, nautical instruments and a few other articles of value were alone rescued.

"Things looked very dubious for us on the first four days of our trip, for we experienced extremely rough weather. On the fifth day the storm abated and we sailed along without further hardship until reaching Hilo, after traveling a distance of 800 miles in a little over eight days, at a distance of nearly a hundred miles a day. We are all most thankful for our safe arrival in Hilo, and are being treated very cordially by the hospitable people."

The Centaur was an iron bark, owned by Johnson, Sprout & Co. of Liverpool, England, and was a fine vessel, both in speed and appearance.

HILO ITEMS.

BEAUTIFUL MAUNA LOA.

In a private letter Miss Anna Paris, of Kailua, thus writes of Mokuaweoweo:—"We have had a grand view of the outbreak on Mauna Loa. There is no better point on the whole coast from which it can be seen, but I regret to say it is now subsiding. Tuesday night the 21st, the sight was glorious. The whole mountain top was adame with the glow of sunset, and in the morning a cloudy pillar of fire rested above the spot till nearly sunrise. Last night, April 24th, there was still a glow from the top of the mountain, but the fire is evidently diminishing, or else seeking some subterranean channel. It was a beautiful sight last night, looking across the bay, in the soft moonlight to the mountain slopes beyond, lighted up by this hidden fire and one not soon forgotten."
