PROST IN DIXIE.

A Cold Wave Does Serious Injury in the Sunny South.

CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—Dixie is in the dumps. Jack Frost has squeezed her so hard that she has lost her breath. Dispatches from Georgia, North and South Carolina, Tennessee, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas, tell stories of severely damaged crops.

The peach crop in Georgia and the Carolinas has been ruined irretrievably. In many places in the warmer latitudes of the three states, trees had become to blossom and bloom. Wherever freezing weather struck these orchards there will be no yield this season, and wherever the sap had risen in the trees to any extent everything was destroyed.

TITCOMB DISCHARGED.

Judge Stanley Finds That the State's Case Fell.

The proceedings for commitment in the Jules Titcomb case were dismissed yesterday afternoon by Judge Stanley. In the day the defense put on the witness stand the Japanese doctor who had made the post mortem examination. He testified that he had examined the body closely, but had not found any mark or discoloration. Other witnesses had previously testified to the contrary saying that they had noticed bruises on deceased.

Judge Stanley held that there was not sufficient evidence for committing the defendant and Titcomb was discharged.

FIFTY-FOUR YEARS.

Death of D. F. Sanford After Over Half a Century Here.

A man who had spent fifty-four years of his life in these islands died last evening. Daniel F. Sanford landed at Lae, Alaska from the whaler Hattress, of New Bedford, Capt. Sherman, in 1845, and has been in this country ever since. He was for many years a cooper on various plantations. Lately he has been engaged as instructor in carpentering, etc., at the Reform School. Deceased was a native of Boston. He leaves three sons and three daughters, all well known. One daughter is the wife of Capt. O. Bergstrom, and another the wife of J. A. McGuire. There are eight grandchildren. Mr. Sanford always had the confidence of the best people of the country and in older days held official positions. He was sheriff of districts on Hawaii. He came to Honolulu to reside permanently on the invitation of Kamehameha III.
